Go to Portland. — A number of local Knights of Columbus are planning to go to Portland, June 28, to attend a big meeting of the order there. The Portland council will confer the Third Degree on a number of candidates.

Catch Smelt in Bay. — Yesterday and today, the wharf near the Plant and Alliance docks have been lined with fishermen, mostly boys. A large number of smelt are being caught, some being six or eight inches long. They bite on almost any kind of bait.

Plat Tract. — The plat of the La Crosse farm on South Coos River, recently bought by a local syndicate and headed by Russ Tower and now known as LaCrosse Park, was accepted at a meeting of the stockholders the other night. It is planned to sell the entire tract this summer in small tracts for summer homes and truck and fruit gardening.

Will Raise Pay. — Owing to the increased business of the Marshfield and North Bend postoffices, Postmasters Curtis and Russell will get substantial increases in salary after July 1. The salary of Postmaster Curtis of Marshfield will be increased from \$2,000 to \$2,300 per annum while Mr. Russell's salary will be advanced from \$1,400 to \$1,500 per annum.

Repertoire Company Pleases. — Margaret Iles and Company played last night to the largest audience they have had since they opened their week's engagement in Marshfield and made a greater hit than ever. The bill was "The Rose of the Ranch" and resembled Blanche Bate's "The Girl of the Golden West." Miss Iles and the other members of the company were enthusiastically applauded frequently. The company is declared to be the best that has ever appeared on Coos Bay.

Protest Against Oil. — Local fishermen are discussing the advisability of instituting steps to prevent oil burning vessels cleaning their tanks in the bay. They claim that if it is allowed to continue, the oil refuse will kill all of the fish, clams and crabs in the bay. It is likely that they will take it up through Deputy Game Warden Cal Wright. O. B. HINSDALE of Gardiner, was in Marshfield yesterday to attend a regular monthly meeting of the directors of the First National bank of which he is president. He says that everything is going about as usual at Gardiner, the mill having all the business it can conveniently handle.

JOHN PETERSON of Empire, was in Marshfield last evening on business and calling on friends. He says everything is serene at Empire, but that most of the people are giving up hopes of the Southern Oregon Company reopening its mill during the present year.
