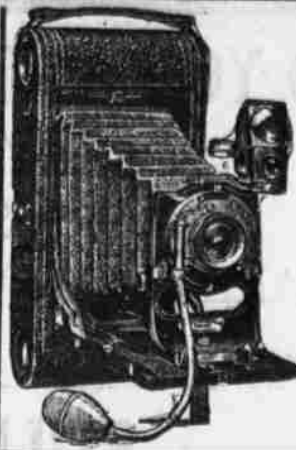

Last Election.

WEDDERBURN, Ore., June 18.—
Curry county elected mostly Republi-
cans at the election, the following
officers being chosen: Judge E. A.
Bailey; sheriff, Norman Tyler; super-
intendent, W. S. Guerin; commis-
sioner, O. Ismert. Guerin is the only
Democrat in the list. The county
went dry again by a vote of 275 to
143. The vote on state senator in
the county was as follows: W. C.
Chase, 171; S. L. Curry, 48; R. D.
Hume, 137; Hugh McLain, 143.
