CANDLES POPULAR.

The World Uses More of Them Now Than It Ever Did Before.

The "tallow dip" of our grandfathers is no longer made of tallow, exactly. It is made of stearic acid, which is only one ingredient of the tallow that grows in the sheep and in the steer.

Neither is the "tallow dip" of today a real "dip." They used to take long wicks and dip them in hot tallow, time after time, till the candle had acquired the proper thickness. Today they run hot stearic acid into molds and make a hundred candles instantaneously.

The "tallow dip" on the market today, therefore, would be more accurately described if it were called a "stearic acid mold." But nevertheless it remains a tallow product. It is the direct lineal descendant of the "tallow dip" of our grandfathers. And it is still so popular that just about 130,000,000 pounds of tallow, according to the calculation of one of the best informed manufacturers of Chicago, are consumed every year in the candle factories of the United States. Although gas and kerosene and electricity have deprived the candle of a large part of the popularity to which it might be entitled, it is probable that in both hemispheres today there are more candles shedding their mild and humble radiance than in any previous period of the world's history.—Technical World.

NO CHANGES IN GAME LAW

Cal Wright, Deputy Game Warden, Issues Notice to Hunters.

Editor Times:

My attention has been called frequently during the last two weeks to the fact that certain individuals are deliberately informing the public that the deer and other game laws have been repealed and that the common understanding in respect to the same is unfounded. Whether these men are pursuing this course maliciously or with the intent to profit by the innocent and unwitting following of this advice, I do not know, but I believe it is advisable that such portions of the public who have been so informed should understand the law.

The hunting season for elk is between September 15th and October 15th.

"It shall be unlawful at any time within the counties of Coos and Curry to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure, destroy, or have in possession any female deer; and it shall be unlawful within the counties of Coos and Curry, at any time between the fifteenth day of October of each year and the fifteenth day of July of the following year, to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession any buck deer."

The law is plain and it will be enforced wherever I get evidence that the same is being or has been violated.

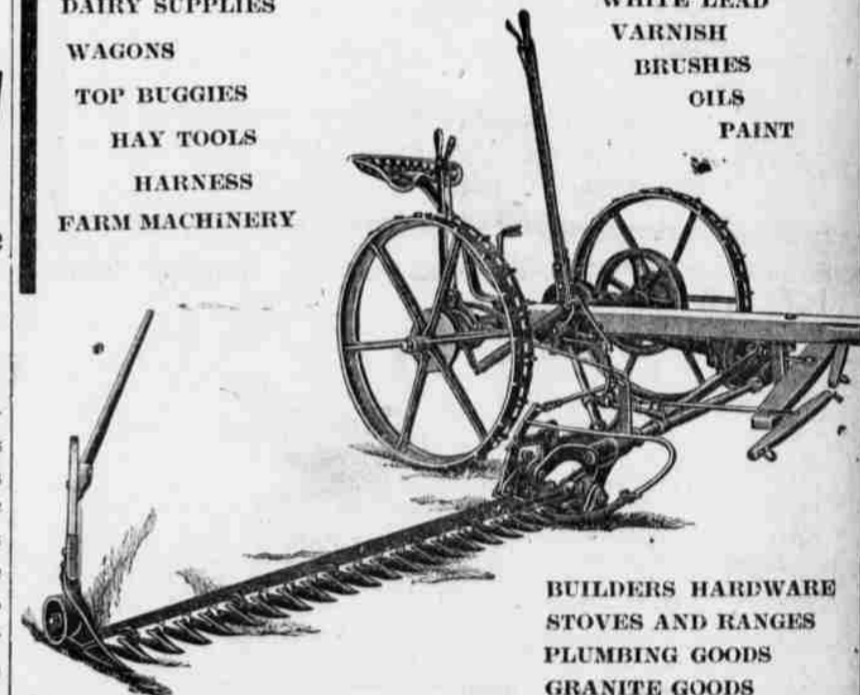
