HAWAII WILL BREED CATS

Unique Method by Which Island Hopes to Get Rid of Rats.

Though he sings upon the fencepost, Though he yowls the whole night through,

Do not angry be at Thomas— See the good that he may do; Do not steal out in pajamas. On a mad and murderous mission, For Thomas may be catching rats With a Board of Health commission.

There is a suggestion for Marshfield in the recent action of the Territory of Hawaii, which through its Board of Health, may shortly establish a cattery, where felines of doughy parentage will be bred and raised with a view to becoming official rat-catchers for the board. The stock for the cattery will be carefully selected, and only cats who have proved themselves good ratters will be placed there, while their progeny will be raised with a taste for rats and finally turned loose throughout the city to prey upon the carriers of the bubonic flea.

This proposal was made at a regular meeting of the Board of Health by President Cofer, who stated that the idea had been suggested to him by Dr. Koch, the great bacteriologist, who recently visited there. Dr. Koch's idea was that cats, selected for their ratching ability, should be selected to be the progenitors of ratching cats, raised on rat meat and brought up with a taste for rat and turned loose when sufficiently grown to rustle their own living in the city. Such cats, he thought, would soon decrease the rat population, with a corresponding decrease in the possibility of any future outbreak of bubonic.

"So the Territory may soon have an established cattery," concluded the president to the members of his board, the only suggestion offered in return by one of the members being that it would be wise to also select the stock cats so as to produce a mute strain for official use.

MYRTLE POINT POINTERS.

Items of Interest Taken From The Enterprise.

A. T. Train, the poultryman, who lives east of the city, received a dispatch stating that his son, Thomas Shepard Train, aged 18, was killed in a wreck at Chadron, Neb. The last he knew of his son he was at Spokane, but he had undoubtedly left for a trip east. He thinks he must have been identified by a letter on his person, as he and his brother had been in correspondence and the names in the dispatch were correct. Mr. Train wired friends at Rapid City, S. D., to take care of the body and see that his son had worthy interment, and the burial will be held, probably, at either Chadron or Rapid City. The account showed that the wreck was caused by a cloud burst, there being five killed—the engineer, fireman, brakeman and two passengers; two others were reported missing. Thomas was the second son of Mr. Train and known to many people of Myrtle Point.

J. B. Warfield, who has been working on a road contract up the Middle Fork, had the misfortune to fall from a bridge and shatter his right shoulder blade. He was brought to town by E. C. Roberts and given surgical attention. The fracture is said to be quite serious and will undoubtedly lay the victim of the accident up for several weeks.

W. M. Carver, who is just home from a business trip to Langlois, reports the sudden death there of Mrs. Dick Sorensen, the landlady of the hotel. The death occurred from heart disease, soon after the hour for retiring. Mr. Sorensen summoned his daughters hastily, the doctor was sent for at once, but death took place soon after the medical man had arrived. Mr. Carver says that the members of the family were very much distressed and heart broken. Mrs. Sorensen was well and favorably known by the people of Langlois and vicinity, and her death will be genuinely mourned in that community.

B. B. Bartlett of Catching Creek, brought in a sample of asyke clover this week that measured six feet and a half in length, as cut off by the mowing machine. Mr. Bartlett said the grass had been partly under water in the early part of the season, but that seemed to fill the plant's requirements rather than prove an injury, and he has harvested a fine crop from the field. He considers it the very thing for low, wet ground where water does not stand too long.
