WILL CHARGE FOR BURIAL PERMITS HERE

Marshfield to Impose Tax On Interment of Bodies of Non-Residents In Local Cemetery.

At the suggestion of Dr. E. Mingus, the city of Marshfield is planning to impose a tax on corpses of non-residents buried in the Marshfield cemetery. The amount has not been fixed yet, but it has been suggested that \$2 be charged for burial permits for corpses of all non-residents of Marshfield except the indigent poor of the county.

The Marshfield city council has instructed City Attorney Farrin to draft an ordinance providing for this and it will probably be adopted at the next session.

Dr. Mingus suggested it in order that the cost of inspection of these cases not fall entirely on the city. He said that the city had to go to considerable expense to maintain its health department and that much of the work consisted in seeing that contagion was not spread by corpses brought in here from outside.

Many corpses from North Bend, Empire and other points in the county are brought to Marshfield for burial, the other cities not maintaining cemeteries.

UNABLE TO AGREE ON STREET NAMES

Committee Appointed by Chamber of Commerce Have Diverse Opinions On Subject.

The committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to report on a system of renaming Marshfield's streets and numbering the houses, have been unable so far to agree. The members have a system all right, but it won't work out or had not up to the time of council meeting Tuesday. The committee agrees on naming the streets running north and south and numbering the houses fronting them. But on account of the irregular shore line, each member of the committee has a plan of his own and up to the hour of council meeting Tuesday, it would not have been possible to have handed in anything, but three separate minority reports. An engineer is now working with the committee, and it is possible that an agreement will yet be reached without bloodshed. It is predicted by one member of the committee that if the question is opened for debate in the council, it will result in a discussion that would make a national democratic convention seem like a church meeting.

WARM TIME IN ROSEBURG NOW

Women Boosters and City Council Clash Over Schemes For Improving the Town.

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 10. — The activity of the Lady Boosters of Roseburg brought them into conflict with the city council on two different occasions at the regular meeting of the latter body. The proposed public drinking fountain and the clean-up day on the 10th of last month, both of which enterprises were fostered by the ladies, are the subject which struck discordant notes during the council meeting.

Under Section 33 of the City Charter, prohibiting the council from granting permission for the emplacement of any permanent obstruction in a street, the judiciary committee, with W. W. Cardwell as chairman, reported adversely on the application of Roseburg ladies for the privilege of installing a public drinking fountain on Cass street, in front of the Rochdale store. Without a dissenting voice the report was adopted. This action, however, will probably not prevent the installation of the fountain, which was ordered several weeks ago. Pending its arrival, the ladies will endeavor to secure some other location for it. The park being laid out adjoining the Elks' Temple is prominently spoken of in this connection.

Cut "Cleanup Bill."

A storm of words broke loose when the council was presented with \$52 worth of teamsters' bills, contracted by the lady boosters in cleaning up the city last month. The ladies agreed to pay one-half (\$26) of this bill, but a majority of the council flatly refused to stand for more than \$12 of the other half. And this is why: Several months ago the council passed a resolution that no bill against the city would be recognized by the council unless it had been contracted either in open meeting or by authority of what is known as the "requisition committee," of which Joseph Micelli is chairman. When the ladies applied to Mr. Micelli for financial assistance in cleaning up the city, he issued a requisition for the employment at the city's expense of three teams for one day at \$4 each, making a total of \$12. That was the amount the council expected to pay. Therefore, when it was confronted with a bill for over four times that amount some pointed objections naturally arose. Councilman Cardwell, Fisher and

WOULD INSIST ON LAW BEING ENFORCED

Coos Bay Registered Pharmacists Talk of Prosecuting Drug Stores Which Have No Registered Men

An effort that is being made to have the Oregon law which requires all drug stores and pharmacies to have a registered pharmacist strictly enforced is meeting with favor among the registered pharmacists on Coos Bay and they are talking of taking steps to compel all local drug stores to comply with it. They claim that it is unfair to the drug stores which comply with the law by going to the expense of having a registered pharmacist to allow others to run and handle prescription business without having a registered pharmacist. Worthington championed the bill, however, declaring that the extra expense was necessary in order to do the cleaning work thoroughly and that the mayor, himself, had authorized the ladies to engage the teamsters above the time granted by Mr. Micelli. Councilmen Long, Josephson, Wright and Patrick stood with Micelli, however, refusing to recognize such authority assumed by the mayor, and, adhering to the previously established rule, voted down a motion to stand \$26 of the bill. A subsequent motion to allow \$12 was carried with Cardwell dissenting.

The Oregon law is quite stringent, providing a fine of \$50 for each offense, the filling of a prescription by an unregistered man being considered an offense. The law also provides a penalty for the use of the words "drug store" or "pharmacy" in signs if there is not a registered pharmacist connected with the establishment.
