Bandon Loads With Lumber. - The Bandon reached Coos Bay yesterday and went direct to the C. A. Smith mill where she is loading with lumber for the south.

Eureka In and Out. - The Eureka arrived from Portland today and sailed late for Eureka. Contractor W. O. McCann was one of those sailing from here to Eureka on her.

Declares Dividend. - The East Marshfield Land Company, the stockholders of which are practically all Marshfield men, declared an eight per cent dividend today.

Several Go to Eureka. - Jonathan Quick, Mrs. W. L. Kistner and mother of Coquille, and W. E. Pomeroy of Lampa Creek, came over from the Valley today. They are en route to Eureka, Cal.

Electrical Storm Here. - One of the rare electrical storms visited Coos Bay about 5:30 this morning, following a shower. The lightning was fairly brilliant with several sharp peals of thunder, indicating a severe thunderstorm in the valleys.

Gardiner Man Appointed. - Robert Ashworth of Gardiner, well-known on Coos Bay, has been appointed first deputy by Sheriff-Elect Fenton of Douglas county, and will begin his new duties at once.

Phone Franchise Not Signed. - Mayor E. E. Straw has not yet signed the telephone franchise granted R. T. Durett last week, but said this afternoon that he expected to sign it. If it is not signed by tomorrow night, it will probably come up for consideration by the council again.

Baumbaugh's Move Away. - E. P. Baumbaugh and wife, left on the M. r. Plant for San Francisco, deciding to seek another location. The bath parlors which Mr. Baumbaugh conducted have been closed, and negotiations are now underway for their sale.

New Railway Agent. - Geo. H. Dunning, who has been railroad agent here for several months, is to be transferred to Marshfield. Mr. Dunning has given good satisfaction.

No one at Drain, so far as he could ascertain knew of any orders being out indicating early resumption of work on the road.

Want Telephone. - Editor Crippen of the Coquille Sentinel, is in Marshfield today to interview W. U. Douglas and R. T. Durett concerning a new telephone exchange for Coquille. Mr. Durett is out of town but Mr. Douglas will take the matter up, probably. The Coquille city council is said to be ready to give as liberal a franchise as any of the cities to secure better service.

Will Remodel Home. - W. U. Douglas is arranging to remodel, enlarge and otherwise improve his home on 'C' avenue. While the work is being done, the Douglas family will enjoy an outing near the lighthouse, camping out for a couple of months. They will go down next Saturday. Mr. Douglas will spend Sundays with them during the outing.
