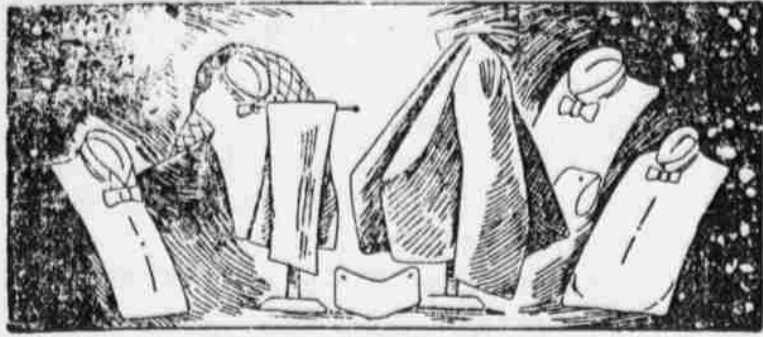

Will Open Restaurant.—E. C. Anderson from Portland has leased the room in the Rogers building at 'A' and Front street formerly occupied by E. L. Wheeler's real estate office and will open a restaurant there within a few days.

Finishes New Building.—W. F. Squire is completing the new two-story store building which he recently started in Bunker Hill addition opposite the C. A. Smith mill. The structure is frame with ground dimensions of 20x48 feet.

Present Phone Petition.—Citizens of Coquille have presented Manager L. R. Robertson of the Pacific States Telephone Company, a petition asking for improvements in the phone service there and also changes regarding the switching charges on the Coquille-Myrtle Point loop.

Delay School Contract.—Owing to the absence of J. W. Bennett, a member of the school board, on his annual deer hunt, the bids for the new Marshfield school building will not be opened tomorrow. The acceptance of bids will close July 16, but no awards will be made before Saturday.

Honors For Former Coos Bay Man. Howard M. Brownell who has just been appointed deputy prosecuting attorney for Clatsop county, Oregon, is well known on Coos Bay having formerly practised law here, at Coquille and at Bandon. He left a number of years ago, going to Astoria.

Former Resident Drowns.—According to press dispatches, Herbert H. McLain, a Stanford University man who played on the Marshfield baseball team part of last season, was drowned at Bay Point, California, near San Francisco, while bathing Sunday. He made a number of friends during his short residence here who sincerely regret the accident.

Enforce Game Laws Strictly.—Cal. Wright, deputy game warden, is

maintaining his usual vigilance in seeing that deer hunters do not violate the state laws, the open season having opened today. It has been reported to him that some have been running deer with dogs and he proposes to make an example of some one as this is strictly in violation of the law.

Pleasant Picnic Party.—Mrs. Wm. Lawlor, Jr., was a hostess to a pleasant picnic party given yesterday in honor of Mrs. V. L. Verdell, Mr. Lawlor's sister who is visiting here. Some half-dozen ladies were in the party and enjoyed a most delightful day.

Fish Warden Coming.—H. C. McAllister, the master fish warden of Oregon, is expected here the latter part of this week to inspect the Coos river hatchery. He is on a general inspection trip. Everything is in good shape at the Coos river hatchery, Superintendent F. S. Smith now being engaged in rebuilding the racks which were washed out by a freshet last winter.

New Building Ordinance.—City Attorney Farrin and Mayor E. E. Straw after having consulted a number of architects have drafted a new building ordinance for Marshfield and a special meeting of the city council will be held tonight or sometime this week to pass it. The ordinance is said to be quite stringent in its provisions, its object being to eliminate dangerous construction.

Catch Big Cod Fish.—F. W. Reeder has returned from Charleston Bay where he has been camping since the first of the month. The other members of the party, Mrs. Reeder and daughter and F. E. Boden and wife are expected home today. Mr. Reeder says that he caught cod fish weighing more than thirty pounds near Charleston and that they secured rock oysters by the gallon without effort.

Bandon Band Coming.—President F. P. Norton of the Second Southern Oregon District Fair, which will be held here August 26 to 29, inclusive, has engaged the Bandon concert band as one of the attractions for the fair. He made arrangements with George Topping of Bandon yesterday. The Bandon band is one of the best musical organizations in the northwest and Mr. Norton is highly gratified over being able to secure them.

Signs Phone Franchise.—Mayor E. E. Straw last evening affixed his signature to the telephone franchise which was recently granted R. T. Durett. Mr. Durett is in Portland consulting with representatives of the Home Telephone Company which is to back his project. He has thirty days in which to accept the franchise. He is also negotiating with the Pacific States Telephone Company regarding the purchase of the local exchanges.

No Electric Railway Franchise Granted.—A report that the Marshfield council at a secret session recently had granted a franchise to Seymour H. Bell and others for an electric railway in Marshfield caused considerable commotion among Marshfield people last evening and this morning. City Clerk W. F. Squire said that the report was absolutely unfounded, that there had been no secret session and that the electric line franchise had not been brought up since it was withdrawn several months ago.
