CHANGE MADE IN ELKS'

OFFICIAL INSIGNIA DALLAS, Tex., July 13.—The Elks' reunion of 1908 closed yesterday, the grand lodge adjourning to meet in Los Angeles July 11, 1909. The last session saw various minor changes made in the constitution. The per capita tax was reduced from 25 cents to 20 cents per annum, as recommended by the retiring grand exalted ruler, John K. Tener; an official Elk emblem was adopted; the proposition to establish a home for the orphans of Elks was defeated and a resolution passed praising Dallas and Texas for their hospitality.

The emblem as described consists of "a combination of the dial, showing the hour of 11, with a white face and red Roman numerals, circumscribed by a blue circle containing the initials 'B. P. O. E.' on which dial and circle shall rest an elk's head and antlers, which shall be surmounted by a red five-point star." The elk's head and antlers are to be in gold, the dial, star and border in enamel.

DEBS PREDICTS TAFT WILL BEAT BRYAN

Socialist Candidate Says His Own Vote Will Surprise Even His Supporters.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 21.—Eugene V. Debs, socialist candidate for president, who spent several hours in Little Rock last week, said:

"The Democratic Convention has given labor a new Chinese puzzle for a labor plank, but the working people have starved too long to be satisfied with the husks. They demand something real and tangible.

"Bryan has been nominated and Taft will be elected not because Bryan is not considered safe by the capitalists, but because the capitalists do not care to longer associate themselves with the dying middle class.

"The magazines are printing all they can get on socialism, and one wants an interview with me for its October number to answer the question, 'What is the matter with America?'

"We will poll a larger vote this year than even the socialists think, for the enforced idleness of the working class has driven them to action, and their action will be expressed this year at the ballot box."
