Hart Gets License.—Harry Hart, a former bartender for J. C. Wilcox, has been given his license to open the former Wilcox saloon in North Bend. No protests were received in time to prevent the action.

Will Build Barn.—Arrangements are being made by John Preuss for the erection of a large barn on his ranch near Bullards. Carpenters and an architect went down today to make preliminary arrangements for the construction.

Nann Smith Out. — The Nann Smith ran down to Empire this morning where she will finish loading from lighters and then sail for the south. The Fifield will follow her out tomorrow, probably.

Carload of Melons.—A carload of melons for the Coos Bay country was brought up on the M. F. Plant today. They were shipped from Fresno. While the price is a little high, it is stated that it probably won't go very low any time this season.

Seriously Injures Hand. — Chas. Corthell severely cut his hand while chopping kindly at his home in East-side last evening. The ax struck his left hand at the knuckle joint, almost severing the index finger. Dr. Magnus who dressed the wound hopes to prevent the finger remaining stiff. The injury will lay Mr. Corthell up for six weeks or so, probably.

Get Two Deer.—Col. Wm. Grimes and Dr. Houseworth are expected home today from their deer hunt near the Gould ranch on North Coos River. Senator J. S. Coke who was with them for a while returned night before last. Mr. Coke stated that they had killed two fine bucks, one of them being brought down by Dr. Houseworth who declared that it was evidence to Tom Bennett, et al, that he could get the real thing as well as a "dummy."

Get Many Trout.—D. Y. Stafford and wife have returned from a very enjoyable outing on the upper Coos river and Mills creek. They caught 126 fine mountain trout while away. Mr. Stafford says that fair progress is being made on the new stage route to Drain which will provide a more direct way of reaching Drain. The new route will be a very scenic one passing under Silver Falls and over Golden Falls.

C. J. HILLSTROM EXPLAINS 'C' AVENUE OBJECTION

Wants Improvements But Wants to Bear Only What Is His Legal Part of Expense.

Editor of Times: In your edition of July the 22d appeared in the report of action of the city council, a statement which may be misleading for lack of details. It reads as follows: Received a protest from C. J. Hillstrom against the proposal to build the 'C' street elevated roadway other than in the middle of the street.

Now I wish to explain this, as I wish everybody in general and the propertyholders along 'C' street in particular, to understand that I have no complaint whatsoever to make against the proposed improvement and furthermore I would protest against having it changed.

The elevated roadway referred to is to be built in middle of north half of the street, because the south side of that portion of said street is not ordered open at this time. But, my protest filed with the city council was to the effect that I would not pay for such improvement to be made in north half of said street, and which is not abutting to my property. I protested because it is an illegal assessment and it is unfair for the reason that when the city council would deem it necessary to improve the south half of said portion of said street, then I would have to stand the expense alone for the whole improvement abutting on my property.

I think that this is a little mistake in levying the assessment which can be corrected. But I do not want to have the whole community to think that I would get so foolish as to protest against an improvement since the time of said protest is expired long ago.
