FUNDS TO OPERATE DREDGE OVER TO

Place Citizens Coos Bay \$15,050 In Banks For Work.

EXPECT DREDGE HERE SHORTLY

Committee Named to Take Charge of Sale of Dredgings, etc.

Formal notice was mailed to Major McIndoe, engineer in charge of the government improvements on the North Pacific coast, that \$15,050 had been placed to his credit in Coos Bay banks by the citizens to defray the expenses of the dredge in improving the inner Bay. Unless something unforeseen occurs, the dredge will be towed from Portland to Coos Bay about August 15 and will be ready for operations soon afterward. A government inspector is expected here before that date to instruct the people concerning the erection of bulk-heads and retaining walls to hold the dredgings used in filling low lots or lands,

It is believed that the \$15,050 with the income from the sale of the dredgings will be more than ample to defray the expenses of the dredge until Congress makes an appropriation for the improvement of the local harbor. J. E. Oren, C. J. Mil lis and Dr. E. Mingus have been elected by the Coos Bay subscribers to take charge of the matter. North Bend subscribers will elect two other members of the committee,
