**Go On Picnic.**—Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Grimes and Mrs. A. L. Houseworth composed a picnic party that went up Coos River today to enjoy a short outing.

**Made Long Trip.**—The barkentine Gleaner is now being overhauled at North Bend after a sixty-three days run from Iquiqui which is 5,020 miles from Coos Bay.

**Horses to Wedderburn.**—L. J. Simpson and John Herron have sent several horses to Wedderburn to participate in the Marchmont race meet which will open about August 17.

**Bud Holland Better.**—A letter from Bud Holland announces that he is slowly recovering from his illness. He is still in Portland, having been overcome before he could reach St. Martin's Springs where he started for.

**Decision Modified.**—The decision in the case of E. O. Hall vs. Eugene O'Connell in the Supreme Court, which was rendered a short time since has been slightly modified on the petition for a rehearing and the rehearing denied.

**Improves Store.**—J. H. Milner has some extensive improvements underway in his hardware store on 'A' street. The remodeling and improvements will convert the store into one of the most attractive and conveniently arranged places of business in the city and incidentally allow more room for stock.

**Fishing Is Better.**—Trout fishing on Coos River is improving, many trout running up stream during the last few days. Many big catches are reported by members of the summer

colonies. Yesterday, Mrs. C. W. Tower landed a fine three-pound trout, one of the largest secured in the South Fork this season.

**Redfield Was Leaking.**—The F. S. Redfield which had trouble with its crew at Empire a few weeks ago but finally succeeded in getting a new crew, reached San Francisco after a hard trip. When the big lumber-cargo which she was carrying for the C. A. Smith Lumber Company, was unloaded, it was found that she was leaking badly.

**Held For Assault.**—Capt. R. Caughell, at one time captain of the Berwick and well known on Coos Bay, is being held under \$5,000 bonds at San Francisco for assaulting a man named Georgeson. Caughell charges Georgeson with insulting Mrs. Caughell and administered a severe beating. Caughell is now captain of the ferry steamer Antelope in Golden Gate Bay.

**Degree of Honor Banquet.**—The Marshfield lodge of the Degree of Honor held a banquet and social at their hall last evening in honor of the officers and delegates who recently returned from the Grand lodge session at Portland. Reports of the Grand lodge were presented by Mrs. Hattie McCormac, Mrs. Janet Escott and Mrs. Fannie Hazard. Following the banquet, a number of the guests enjoyed an informal dance.

**Flyer Is Rebuilt.**—Thomas L. Lawhorne and C. W. McCulloch, who recently purchased the hull of the steamer Flyer are having it rebuilt on plans that will make it one of the best boats on the Bay. They expected to have it ready for the run between Marshfield and North Bend by August 25. Messrs. McCulloch and Lawhorne are well-known as Bay navigators and their many friends will wish them success in their new venture.

**Breakwater Comes Saturday.**—Agent L. W. Shaw has received advice that the Breakwater which has been undergoing repairs at San Francisco will sail from the Golden Gate August 6, and reach here early Saturday. This will enable her to go out on her regular schedule to Portland Saturday. The City of Panama which has been taking the Breakwater's place will sail from here for San Francisco Saturday, carrying passengers and freight down.
