SCHOOL BOARD SAVES MONEY

Among the surviving relatives are Anna Jacobsen, Elmer Jacobsen, Frank Jacobsen, Harvey Hunter, Byron Hunter, Melvin Hunter and Walter Hunter. Her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Hunter lives in North Bend.

TEN MILE COUPLE SEPARATES. Mrs. Wm. Bushnell Sues For Divorce At Roseburg. ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 8.—After existing 28 years, marriage has proven a failure in the case of Mary E. and William Bushnell, of Ten Mile, who were married at Camas Valley in 1880. The wife has filed a suit for divorce in the circuit court here, alleging that in January, 1902, her husband began a course of cruel and inhuman treatment toward her. She says in her complaint that he cursed and struck her repeatedly since that date and finally, on May 11, of this year, drove her from her home. She also alleges that for the past ten years she has contributed almost entirely to her own support and that of their children, four in number, ranging in age from 12 to 3 years, and of whom she asks custody. Mrs. Bushnell also asks money with which to conduct her suit for the temporary maintenance of herself and children, and for one-half of all the real and personal property of her husband, estimated in value at \$2700.

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
