ENTERPRISE'S HARD FIGHT

WEDDERBURN RADIIUM HAS THE BIG STORY OF THE ACCIDENT TO THE ENTERPRISE.

Wedgeburn Radium has the big story of the accident to the Enterprise. The Enterprise, a gasoline schooner, was grounded on the Rogue river and Coos Bay, in a sand bar, while attempting to pass the bar at the entrance to the river, after waiting several hours for a favorable opportunity. She had reached here on a trip to Coos Bay and had on only a light cargo.

Captain Johnson arrived off the bar shortly before noon with the Enterprise and thought the bar rough for passage. He accordingly laid off the entrance expecting to pass when the wind should die in force as evening approached. If past six he believed the passage could be made and came up for a first attempt failed, as he lost the channel, and those watching the hills thought they saw a sea break over the schooner. The crew retraced the course and reached the coast. On the second attempt, the Enterprise was brought to the right channel, but the engine suddenly ceased running, and the boat drifted on a shoal outside the main channel. She rested in about two feet of water, upright, about 75 yards from shore. The boat was hoisted after the boat was

"Appliances were loaded in boats and help was rushed to the assistance of the stranded boat. A line was run from a 'deadman' anchored on the north spit and fastened to the Enterprise. The Enterprise had no power, and the help which numbered about twenty men, succeeded in pulling the boat off the bar about 11 o'clock, when the tide was at about half flood. The beach was lined with fires to illuminate the scene so that the progress of the work could be watched. As soon as the boat was floated, she was pulled along the channel, through the breakers, into the river's mouth, and later towed to her dock by the Echo, a small gasoline boat.

"During the boat's trials of entrance and her grounding she shipped no water, and her cargo was dry. That she was saved showed good work on the part of the men who had the matter in charge. The boat is worth about \$7,000, and her loss at this time would have meant considerable more than that to her owner, since there would have been no other boat available until the new boat in building at Coquille was finished which will be some time the latter part of this month.

Steps were also taken to provide a distinctive label for association fruit and a committee reported that room had been engaged in the Hermann building for storage purposes during the apple season.
