

# HARRIMAN IS FISHING AT KALAMATH, OREGON

FAMOUS RAILWAY MAGNATE IS LEADING "SIMPLE LIFE" AND ADVOCATES GOOD WAGON ROADS BEFORE RAILROADS.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 13.—E. H. Harriman and party are now enjoying the superb fishing at Pelican Bay and the hunting in the immediate proximity of his resort. He and his sons are enjoying the outing and Mr. Harriman is firmly convinced that Klamath is sure to become one of the greatest resorts in the west. He is becoming acquainted with the people of Klamath, who no longer look upon him as a man they dare not approach, but consider him a fellow-citizen and property-owner in the county. He has at the request of the people here expressed his views on several subjects of local importance, chief among them the construction of good roads. He advocates the building of roads—"first wagon roads and next railroads" is the way he puts it. He has more closely allied himself with the interests of this section by becoming a working member of the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Harriman will remain in Klamath a few weeks. During that time he will visit Crater Lake and follow his guides through the forests in quest of bear. Telegraph connection with the Pelican Bay resort keeps him in constant touch with Wall street, and he is informed on every movement that is made by prominent railroad men.

## FIRE NEAR ROSEBURG.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 13.—The forest fire which was burning about twelve miles from West Fork about two weeks ago, and a little later was reported under control, is again raging. About a dozen men were fighting it Monday and eight more went out from here later. A large body of valuable timber is endangered.

## THREE ARE DROWNED.

Father, Son and Daughter Lose Lives Together. HUNTINGTON, Ore., Aug. 13.—While bathing in Snake River, 14 miles from here, George Evans and his oldest son and daughter were drowned. Mr. Evans had come out of the water and was almost dressed when his son, who was still in the water with the daughter, teaching her to swim, called for help. Mr. Evans rushed in to the rescue, and all three were drowned. Mrs. Evans stood on the bank and witnessed the drowning, being unable to help them.

## FIRE AT ASTORIA. Defective Wiring Causes Loss of About \$25,000.

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 13.—A fire which started supposedly from electric wiring in a room at the rear of the A. Dunbar Company's dry goods store about 8 o'clock in the evening caused a property loss of fully \$25,000, two buildings and the stock of goods they contained being damaged before the flames were extinguished. The principal losses are estimated as follows: A. Dunbar Company, damage to stock, principally by smoke and water, \$18,000; Schofield & Mattson, damage to grocery stock, \$4000; F. Johnson, phonograph supplies and household goods, \$500; Johnson Bros., building, \$1,500; Fulton & Dement, building, \$1,500.

## GRANT COUNTY DRY.

CANYON CITY, Ore., Aug. 13.—Grant is in the list of dry counties, if the decision of Circuit Judge Davis is allowed to remain final. The court today dissolved the temporary injunction, and dismissed the case instituted by the liquor interests.

## SUES FOR DIVORCE.

Rose McFee of Bridge, Coos County, Begins Action.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 13.—Rose McFee is suing Richard McFee, for divorce. Plaintiff alleges that her husband falsely accused her of infidelity and of trying to poison him. She also says in her complaint that he repeatedly cursed her and finally, on June 1, 1908, drove her from their home at Bridge, Coos county. Another allegation is that her husband has contributed only \$6 toward her support for a year past. His general cruel treatment, she says, has undermined her health and affected her nervous system. They were married at Camas Valley in October, 1898, and have an 8-year-old daughter, who has been given by the court into the custody of the mother.

## WANT ORCHARD LANDS.

Thousands of Acres Will Be Converted into Fruit Ranches.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Aug. 13.—The demand for fruit lands near Grants Pass, is stronger this year than ever before. Nearly all the available lands suitable for fruit have been purchased, and these lands are under preparation for orchards, vineyards and berry fields. Land that could have been bought two years and three years ago for \$15 an acre, is selling now for \$150 and \$250 an acre. These lands set to trees, are selling for \$300 an acre. A part of the Elisman place, on which the famous Elisman orchard is located, was sold a few days since for \$6,800.

Several thousand acres in and around Grants Pass, which have been unused, will be set to fruit trees this fall. The country is developing rapidly, and the development is almost entirely along the line of fruit. Irrigation is also being talked of strongly and a cooperative company will be formed for the purpose of constructing an irrigating canal that will water all the arid lands in and about this city.

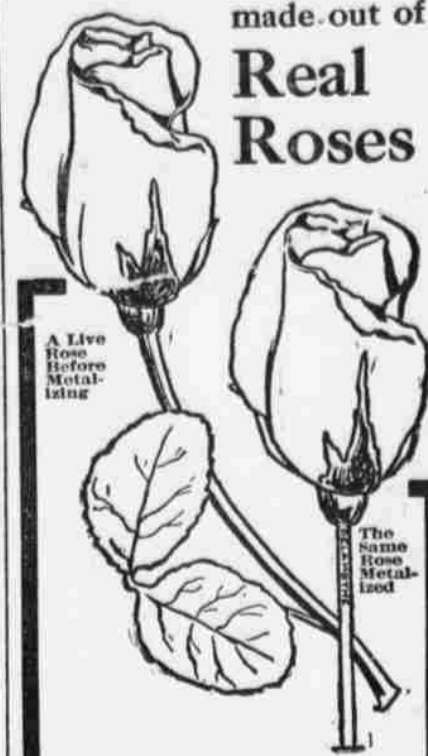
The water will be taken from the Rogue river. The preliminary survey for the Rogue River Valley and Southern railway, an electric line that will be built from Grants Pass to Illinois valley, has greatly increased the demand for farms in that section of Josephine county. The building of this road will increase the population of Kerby, Waldo and Holland five fold within the next three or four years. It seems an assured fact that the road will be built as contracts for the ties are being let by the chief engineer.
