OREGON PIONEER DEAD.

Nicholas T. Day, Indian Fighter and Frontiersman, Dies at Roseburg, ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 14.—Another of Douglas county's prominent and honored pioneers, Nicholas T. Day, passed away at the home of Jesse T. Thompson, at Coles Valley, Mr. Day was nearly 88 years of age.

Mr. Day was born in Taxwell county, Virginia, October 26, 1820. At the age of 21 he emigrated to Wisconsin and engaged in lead mining. While in that state he also voted for its admission into the Union. In 1850 Mr. Day journeyed across the plains into Oregon, stopping first at The Dalles, where he was employed by the government for two months building the historic old log fort, which served as a means of defense against Indian attacks. Mr. Day spent the winter of 1850 in Yamhill county, and in the following March, in company with General Palmer and 21 other men, he went to the mines at Yreka, Cal. In 1852, Mr. Day returned to Oregon settling at the mouth of the Calapooya river, 10 miles west of Oakland, where he remained continuously up to the time his health began to fail.
