

ARRANGE FOR DREDGING BAY

Government Engineer, Here Last of Week to Meet Property Owners.

Wm. G. Carroll of the government engineering corps at Portland will arrive on Coos Bay Friday morning to make preliminary arrangements for the bulkheading, etc., to dispose of the dredgings from the bay when the government dredger starts, the first of next month. Mr. Carroll is being sent by Major J. F. McIndoe, now in charge of the government work.

Concerning Mr. Carroll's visit, Major McIndoe has written Secretary Lyons as follows: "I have the honor to inform you that I am sending Mr. Wm. G. Carroll, junior engineer, to Coos Bay on the steamer leaving here Wednesday, August 19th, to confer with you in the matter of the bulkheading and dredging desired at Coos Bay. Please give him full information in order that he may report to me on his return. It is understood that the expense connected with this journey will be charged to the fund raised by the interests desiring the work done."

Meeting Friday Night.

In order to have a full understanding of the situation, Secretary Lyons has called a meeting of the property owners affected at the Chamber of Commerce Friday night. Mr. Carroll will be present and the entire matter will be fully gone over.

As to the use of the dredging, a large number of owners of low lots are anxious to secure dirt to bring them to grade. It is estimated that the dirt for the ordinary sized lot will cost \$50.

In addition to the dredgings that will be disposed of in this way, it is suggested that the city arrange to fill in 'C' street from the Masonic temple to the hill and Broadway from Mills Inlet to Washington street. It is claimed that these streets can never be constructed as cheaply as it can by the use of the dredgings and as both are among the most important thoroughfares in the city, the proper thing to do is to fill them at once.

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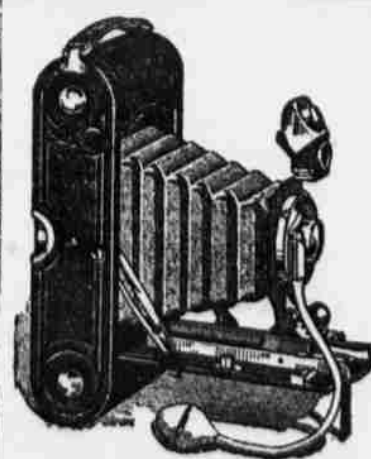
