GOVERNMENT ENGINEER HERE

Will Confer With Citizens Interested In Dredge at Meeting Tonight.

Wm. G. Carroll, junior United States engineer, arrived this morning from Portland to make preliminary arrangements for the government dredge which will arrive here within a few days to improve the harbor and channel. Mr. Carroll's purpose is to consult with leading local citizens and contributors to the fund to secure the dredge and will then report to Major McIndoe, engineer in charge, on the situation. Mr. Carroll said this morning that he did not feel at liberty to make any statement concerning the plans for the dredge. He said he was here to investigate and report his findings to Major McIndoe. He would consult with the local people and try and conform with their wishes so far as practicable.

Mr. Carroll is thoroughly familiar with conditions here, having once represented the government in the Coquille river work and a year ago made the government survey of Coos Bay harbor and bar.

The dredge has not been accepted by the government yet but probably will be within a few days.

Meeting Tonight.

In order to facilitate matters, Secretary Lyon of the Chamber of Commerce, has called a meeting of the contributors to the dredge fund and the owners of property who wish to have it filled by the dredge to be held this evening. Mr. Carroll will be there and talk the matter over with them and give some instructions as to the proper manner of bulk-heading.

Rev. G. S. Clevenger, a prominent Baptist divine and of wide travel, will also speak tonight.

Ex-state Senator, Dr. Andrew C. Smith of Portland, will also be one of the speakers.
