EX-CONVICT TRIES TO KILL BRIDE AND END OWN LIFE

Harry Wanka Nearly Beats Wife to Death at San Francisco.

MARRIED HER TWO DAYS AFTER RELEASE

Took Dose of Laudanum But Stomach Pump Frustrates Suicide.

(By Associated Press.)

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 22 .-Harry Wanka, alias Schoolberger, who was released June 15 from San Quentin penitentiary where he served later married a Miss Smith of Oakland, attempted to murder his bride in their home in this city last night.

Leaving her in a dying condition from the beating. He went to a room in the neighborhood and took a dose of laudanum with suicidal intent. He was found unconscious today, but a prompt application of the stomach pump saved his life.

His wife is lying unconscious in the hospital.

Pending the outcome of her injuries, no charge will be placed against Wanka.

Owing: to the suddenness of the death, Coroner T. J. Lewis determined to have a post mortem examination probably an inquest.

Mr. Lewis, Dr. Horsfall and others eft for the McFarland ranch, which is about one-half mile beyond the North Slough landing, at noon and will investigate the matter.

Mr. McFarland was in Marshfield vesterday and appeared better than he had been for several weeks. While here, he called on Dr. Horsfall. He said that he had been bothered with rheumatism for some time and that he feared there was something else wrong with him. Dr. Horsfall examined him but found no indications of any serious ill. Mr. McFarland at the time spoke-

of taking some capsules that someone had told him were good for him but said he didn't like them as they caused a burning sensation when he swallowed them.

Whether the capsules might have had anything to do with the death will probably be determined by the post mortem examination.

Mr. McFarland returned home yesterday afternoon and about 10:30 last night was taken seriously ill. Will Simpson and N. S.
