## NORTH BEND K. P. BANQUET

COOS BAY LODGES UNITE IN WELCOME TO GRAND CHANCELLOR MOSER OF PYTHIANISM IN OREGON.

Marshfield and North Bend Knights of Pythias united in a banquet and reception at North Bend last night to Grand Chancellor Moser of Oregon Pythianism who is visiting the lodges in the Coos Bay country. About 150 participated in the ceremonies which are declared to have been among the best the order has ever held on Coos Bay. Gov. George E. Chamberlain and Judge Scott were among the guests of honor.

The early part of the evening was devoted to exemplification of the degree work with special instructions from Mr. Moser. Following this, the members repaired to the banquet hall where an elaborate spread was served and where Gov. Chamberlain with quite a delegation from Marshfield joined them.

Archie Whisnant presided as toastmaster and made many hits by his clever introductions of the speakers who responded to toasts. In introducing Governor Chamberlain, he took the toastmaster's license of stretching the truth and told how Gov. Chamberlain was elected a member of an eastern Oregon town's school board just as he was getting off the train to take up residence in the state and said that he had been elected to one office after another ever since. In closing, he said that if Bryan would only stop being a candidate, Mr. Chamberlain would be elected president in 1912.

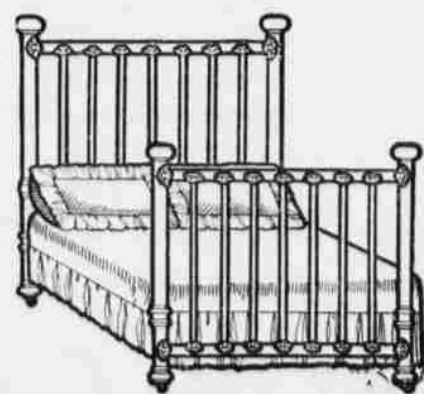
