Get Ready to Handle Fish.—Manager Nicholson of the Coos Bay Ice and Cold Storage plant, has been advised to place it in immediate readiness for receiving and storing fish for the season. They expect to be in shape for work by Saturday.

Will Play Ball.—T. J. Lewis is arranging for an exhibition ball game to be played here a week from Sunday, the proceeds to go towards the Eagles building fund. It is likely that the game will be between the Eagles and Elks.

Brings Cargo of Shingles.—The Wilhelmina arrived yesterday from Bandon with 600,000 shingles. Part of the cargo was for local people but 320,000 was for shipment to San Francisco. The Wilhelmina will leave today for Bandon with about ten tons of miscellaneous freight.

Runs Nail Into Foot.—G. W. Carleton is suffering from a severe injury to his foot as a result of stepping on a nail. The nail pierced the sole of the shoe and penetrated his foot. No serious developments are feared although the injury will be very painful for some time to come.

Take Over Exchange Soon.—Messrs. Duret and Douglas of the Coos Bay Home Telephone Company, announce that they expect to take over the local phone exchange and the Coos and Curry county lines and exchanges of the Pacific Telephone Company within a week or just as soon as a representative of the company who is to conduct the transfer arrives here.

Mrs. Yoakam to State Fair.—Mrs. S. A. Yoakam, state dairy inspector, is down from her Coos River ranch today, and is making preparations to attend the Douglas County Fair now being held in Roseburg. She leaves for Roseburg tomorrow and from there goes to Salem where she assists in the Dairy Exhibit. The Coos county dairy exhibit for the State Fair, which will be forwarded on the next Alliance, will be met at Portland by Mrs. Yoakam who will have charge of it.

Margaret Iles Returns.—The Margaret Iles Company arrived today after a very successful three days tour at Myrtle Point, Coquille and Bandon, and will open at the Opera House tomorrow, Friday evening in the Swedish comedy "Ole Oleson." The same will be repeated on Saturday.
