County Seat News of Interest As Told By the Sentinel.

Billy was down to the ball game Sunday, and states that the new bridge, which is over 100 feet in length and a very substantial structure, will be all completed in a few days. J. D. Bennett is the contractor for the bridge.

Mr. Goetz is teaching the school at Lee and was a candidate for school superintendent in the recent primaries. He informs us that he will resign and leave for Oregon City in about two weeks to accept the principalship of the high school in that place.

Pioneers Joseph Haines and wife of Eckley, passed through Coquille last Saturday for the bay, where they embarked for an extended visit to their children who reside at different points in the Pacific Coast States. Mr. and Mrs. Haines came to Coos and Curry in the earliest years of settlement when only elk and Indian trails led through the timbered mountains, and by toil and frugality they have accumulated a goodly share of this world's goods. Their children have grown up, married and scattered, and this initial visit to their several homes will no doubt be vastly enjoyed.

Delphi Lodge, No. 64, Knights of Pythias, of Bandon dedicated its new hall in that place last Saturday evening with appropriate ceremonies. Quite a number in Coquille belonging to the order went down on the steamer Dispatch, which was held here till 5 p. m., and took part in the interesting exercises. PLAN TO UP BAY

Oregon-Idaho Congress Plans Meetings to Hasten Development

Col. E. Hofer of Salem, a prominent part in the Oregon-Idaho Development, Marshfield, has the following in his paper, the Capitalist:
"A great campaign for development and advertising and southwestern Oregon has been closed at Coos Bay Governor Chamberlain, Ell, Oswald West, B. W. Corvallis, Judge John Marion county, Dr. Andrew of Portland and the office of Willamette Valley League took prominent part. Meetings were held by the Coos Bay and Dredging Inside Harbor, Eugene, Cottage Grove, Roseburg, and a two-day Oregon-Idaho Development Congress was held at Marshfield, the auspices of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce assisted by the North Bend Chamber of Commerce, and a permanent organization formed."

"At all these meetings the following lines of promotion work were taken up and organized and pushed by able men, and the work will be kept up with meetings each month the first to be held at Roseburg about the 25th of September:

"Opening of Deep-sea Harbor Coos Bay and Dredging Inside Harbor."

"Promotion of Steam and Electric Railroad to Coos Bay."

"State Highway Construction Through Western Oregon."

"Automobile Road from Roseburg to Coos Bay, via Myrtle Point."

"State-Aided Railway from Oregon to Coos Bay."

"Opening of Western Oregon Harbors at Sluslaw, Winchester, Yaquina and Tillamook."

"Opening the Locks and Canal Oregon City so that Coos Bay Can Be Brought up the Willamette Valley by Water."

"Breaking up the Large Water Road Land Grants Across this State and Opening Them to Settlement."

"Enactment of a New Water Code and General Port Commission Law to Develop Harbors."

"This is a big program but the determination of the men back of it to fight for big results and put the whole state back of the campaign."

Coos Bay Alive to the Cause.

"The Coos Bay congress was planned and backed by the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, one of the live commercial organizations of Oregon, which has launched the biggest publicity campaign ever started for that section by the organization of the Oregon-Idaho Development congress."

"This congress is a child of necessity and its purpose is to blaze the way for the development of southern, central and southwestern Oregon and southern Idaho."

"The need of railway transportation for this vast area, the breaking up of immense unused tracts of land, the utilization of water powers and development of a deep-sea harbor are among the many objects to be achieved."

"In order to bring about these results it is deemed necessary that a series of meetings be held, both in western and eastern Oregon and southern Idaho, and to that end the President will correspond in the near future, outlining plans in detail."

"The next big Western Oregon Booster congress is to be held at Roseburg the latter part of September, at which time plans will be perfected for construction of a high-class automobile road from that city to Coos Bay, which will run in connection with the Coos Bay and Eastern Railroad making close connections at Myrtle Point, and shortening the time from the Willamette valley to Marshfield from 24 hours of neck-breaking staging to six hours of comfortable traveling."
