Bishop Charles Scadding of the Episcopal diocese of Western Oregon, will make his annual visit to Marshfield Sunday, October 4, and will probably spend a week or more in this section. Plans for the building of an episcopal church at North Bend and organizing other Episcopal congregations in the Coos Bay country will probably be submitted to him during his visit. He will probably be the guest of J. W. Bennett, a close personal friend, during his stay here. It has not been decided yet whether there will be a confirmation class for him in Marshfield this year or not. A class is being instructed at North Bend.

Bishop Scadding recently attended the International Episcopal convention at London to which Bennett Swanton of Marshfield, was also a delegate. He is arranging to strengthen the denomination in Oregon by the organization of many new congregations.

In the eleventh, North Bend had two gone and then it was claimed that they changed the batting order to bring some of the strong stickers. Marshfield protested and the umpire was going to call the man out for batting out of order but the crowd wanted to see it played out and the game continued. North Bend claims that they scored three men and Marshfield claims that none of their scores counted as they forfeited the game by having the men bat out of order. Anyway, it was a pretty good game and the crowd got a lot of enjoyment out of it.
