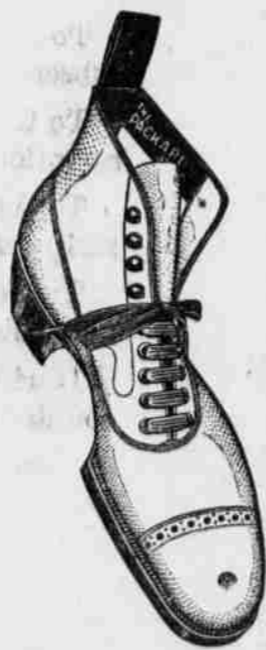

Lumber to Texas.—The Johnson Lumber Company of Coquille, is making large shipments to Texas by the way of Coos Bay. The shipments consist of 125,000 pieces of 2" by 2", any lengths, of clear cedar.

Wilhelmina to Bandon.—The Wilhelmina sailed yesterday afternoon for Bandon, carrying a big cargo of merchandise for the Coquille river. She will return today or tomorrow and will probably make another trip over this week.

Had Fine Trip.—F. P. Norton in a note from Portland says they had a very fine trip from Coos Bay to Portland on the Breakwater, the sea being as smooth as the bay. He and Mrs. Norton go direct to Salem to take in the State Fair.

Found Dead Panther.—A large dead panther was found near the Maxwell mine on Isthmus Slough the other day. A bullet hole in the spine told the story of his demise, the animal evidently having traveled far after some huntsman wounded him.

Building Is Raised.—Col. Wm. Grimes is having his building on Front street raised a few inches to conform with the new grade. The building is being raised without much inconvenience to the tenants, the Chamber of Commerce and the Coos Bay Cash Store.

Former Citizen Missing.—Word has been received here that Jack Angus, who was employed in J. H. Mason's salmon curing establishment in Marshfield last year, has mysteriously disappeared in Alaska. No details have reached here other than that foul play is suspected.

Baby Boy's Bad Luck.—Vernie Ford, the four-year-old son of Mr. Ford of the Gamble meat market had his arm broken yesterday for the second time in three months. The little fellow sustained the fracture in a bad fall, both bones being broken. Owing to the break following the previous injury so closely, it may permanently injure the arm.
