Perform Lorenz Operation.—The noted Lorenz or bloodless operation was performed for the first time on Coos Bay this morning at Mercy hospital when Dr. J. C. O'Day assisted by Dr. A. L. The operation was an entire success and it is believed will permanently cure the defect.

Goes to Curry County.—The Rev. Father Curley has gone to Bandon where he will celebrate mass tomorrow. A week from tomorrow, he will celebrate mass at Wedderburn and will then return to Coos Bay. In consequence of his absence, there will be but one mass in Marshfield tomorrow and a week later, both being at 10:30 o'clock. It was the most largely attended convention in the history of the organization. He also visited friends in St. Louis and stopped a number of the larger cities en route.
