Repair Coal Bunkers.—Bridge Foreman Fahey of the local railway, and a force of men are here to repair the local coal bunkers.

Nann Smith Due.—The Nann Smith is due in today from San Francisco and will load at the Smith mill immediately with lumber for Bay Point.

Roscoe In.—The L. Roscoe came down yesterday to secure supplies for the Gardiner cannery and also merchandise for Gardiner stores. She did not bring down any cargo.

Eastside Schools Open.—The Eastside schools started in on the second week of the fall term this week with a good attendance. The enrollment is considerably more than a year ago.

Lower Floors.—The P. K. saloon at Front and 'A' streets, is being remodelled as a result of the necessity of lowering the floors to conform with the new street grade which was established when the paving was put in.
