

DECIDE FISH LICENSE CASE

Oregon Law Does Not Apply to Those Not Regularly Following the Business.

No license is required to sell fish in the state of Oregon unless the party selling them follows it as a regular occupation.

This is the construction that Deputy District Attorney L. A. Liljeqvist and Justice C. A. Pennock of Marshfield, have put upon the Oregon fish license law. In consequence, Abraham Gustavson has been freed on the charge of violating the measure and also was discharged on the information accusing him of stealing the fish that he sold. The latter decision was based on the lack of evidence.

The two charges against Gustavson were sworn out in Justice Pennock's court by O. A. Wirth, a fisherman who pays a license to sell fish. Although Gustavson sold but one fish, Wirth and other fishermen regularly engaged in the business thought he was infringing upon the rights guaranteed them by the license.

The Oregon statute covering the fish license says that all persons engaged in the business of selling fish must procure a license. Mr. Liljeqvist and Justice Pennock interpret this to mean just what it says and consequently that it does not apply to persons who may sell one fish in a year.

Gustavson was alleged to have stolen the fish from the rear of a local saloon and while he did not explain in detail how he came by the fish, the accusers were unable to prove to the satisfaction of the court that Gustavson really did steal the fish.
