### NEWS OF COQUILLE.

Events of Interest in Valley As Told By The Sentinel.

A daughter was born to Wm. Jess and wife, of the Johnson mill section, August 26th.

We are informed from a reliable source that since there have been two trains a day from Marshfield to Myrtle Point the travel has increased 60 per cent.

Uncle Shad Hudson of Myrtle Point attended the pioneers' reunion in this city last week. Uncle Shad was one of the earliest of the boys, having crossed the plains in 1847. He is in good health except for a badly affected hand.

Martin Alexson began work last Saturday repairing the foundation beneath the gentleman's building on Front street occupied by Oliver Wilson's store and the billiard room of Chas. Harrington. The underpinning will be replaced by concrete blocks.

The cannery at Prosper, also that at Bandon started operations Monday morning, and the pack of silver-sides particularly will be good, it is said. Each cannery has a seine of its own running, but there are several gillnetters and a few seiners doing business on the lower river at present. The usual consignment of Chinamen for work in these concerns passed through Coquille a week ago on their way from Astoria.

### CURRY COUNTY NEWS.

Items of Interest As Told By Wedderburn Radium.

John Greenwood, a young man from Marshfield, arrived in Wedderburn Saturday and is clerking in the Hume store.

J. N. True has sold his abstract business at Gold Beach to W. A. Wood, and will leave Curry county in the near future.

Captain Johnson of the Enterprise, loaded his household goods on the Enterprise and moved to North Bend this week. He has rented a house in Plat A addition to North Bend and will be located near the Charles Winsor residence.

The local warehouse is piled high with sacks of wool aggregating a total of over 11,000 pounds, the 1908 clip from the Hume ranch. John Engleman hauled the sacks from the ranch with his 8-hull team, and they will remain in storage until prices appreciate.

Mr. Barkus, formerly manager of a lumber mill at North Bend, was a guest of R. D. Hume for two days last week. During his stay the Hume sawmill across the river was inspected by Mr. Barkus. Mr. Hume intends to operate this mill and is undecided as yet whether he will leave it where it is now located or move it to the Wedderburn side where its products would be more convenient to his interests.

Samuel Archer was in Wedderburn Monday to purchase supplies. He and a son are prospecting Euchre Creek about twelve miles from the ocean, and are running a sluice. The rewards thus far have not been abundant, though they are taking out some gold. The metal is coarse but not plentiful enough to make the business a paying one. They are in gravel 18 feet in depth, which carries no gold except on bedrock. Mr. Archer is from Coos Bay and has been a miner for the greater part of his life, having spent a number of years in California during its early gold excitement.

### GRADE NEAR DRAIN.

Southern Pacific Will Change Track Near There.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 16. — Changes in the main line of the Southern Pacific between Cottage Grove and Drain have just been authorized and George McCabe, a local railroad contractor, has been given the contract. He has moved a steam shovel and grading machinery on the job and expects to complete the work within the coming month. The change affects about one mile of track and the work to be done includes the elimination of curves, the filling of trestles and the general betterment of the stretch of track.

### NEW WATER WORKS.

Improvement of Myrtle Point System Is Completed.

The new city pumping plant was connected up with the water works system several days ago, just at a time too, when the city water had failed to flow from a majority of the faucets in town. Since the connections have been made there is a good strong flow in all parts of town, the pressure almost equalling that of the winter months. Last Sunday the reservoir on the hill was cleaned out and the water is being used directly from it, with the arrangement that the pump can be started and the reservoir refilled whenever the water becomes too low. George Mullen is engineer. The improvement to the service will be appreciated. In the event of fire there will be ample water for the use of the firemen, and at all times the patrons of the city system can be kept supplied. For a few days the water was somewhat muddy, but it has now cleared and seems to be pure and wholesome.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

### PLANS FOR DEPOT.

Binger Hermann and Railway Get Together at Myrtle Point.

Hon. Binger Hermann returned Thursday from a visit to Bandon and Marshfield. While in Marshfield Mr. Hermann had a talk with Manager Mills of the railroad company and was given to understand that his offer of a depot site was satisfactory and the only thing in the way of its acceptance by the company was the need of a side track on the river side of the site which will necessitate the use of a portion of the county roadway. If the company can secure the right to build a side track as stated the new depot will be built at the foot of Maple street, and a depot and yards that will immensely improve that section of town are contemplated. The plans show a thoroughly modern building with commodious rooms, offices, toilets, etc. The matters of using the road will be presented to the proper officials at an early date and if their action is favorable Myrtle Point will soon have a handsome new depot.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

### HAD PECULIAR AILMENT.

Unusual Development of Appendicitis at Myrtle Point.

For more than a week Miss Ella Arneson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Arneson, has been very sick at the family home northeast of town, and at times her life was despaired of. On last Friday her condition was very serious and a consultation of doctors agreed that only through an immediate operation could her life be saved. Accordingly the operation was undertaken and the appendix of patient removed. It was found that the appendix had burst, but the wound was carefully cleaned and the many friends of the young lady will be pleased to learn that she is gradually recovering, the reports being more encouraging each day. A trained nurse from Portland has been in attendance at the sick bed. Drs. Leep, Stemmler and Johnson performed the operation.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
