New Timber Land to Be Cut Over This Season.

Jack Bester's camp No. 1 of the Smith-Powers logging operations on Cunningham creek is about ready to remove a mile or so farther up stream on a tributary of Cunningham where new and untouched timber will be tapped. The railroad extension thereto is almost completed, and last Saturday a crew of carpenters headed by W. L. Snidow went out to begin the erection of bunk houses, cook house, blacksmith shop, etc. Jack Dashney's camp No. 2 is also to move, but later on. It will have its location a mile to the east of Bester's new haunts, and the railroad will be shovled on to that point also. Both these camps are expected to run through the winter, except when the weather is too severe, which fact will be very acceptable news to the people of Coquille and vicinity.—Coquille Sentinel.
