

The action was an appeal from the county commissioners who had awarded them only \$250 dam-

This suit held back the awarding of a franchise to L. J. Simpson and Seymour H. Bell for the use of the elevated roadway for an electric line. The commissioners will now grant the franchise, according to the understanding at Coquille providing the holders of the franchise pay damages awarded.
