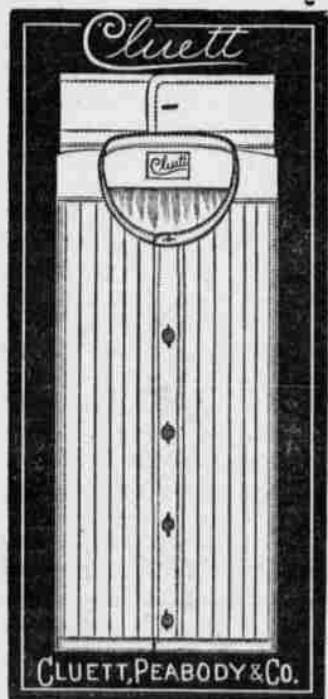

As he secured it unharmed, he says he is willing to pass up the matter as a joke. Kane will leave for his home in Portland on the Breakwater tomorrow. He entirely exonerates Mr. Cooper and the hotel, and says if any blame attaches to any one it is to himself, Kane.

**BRIDGE CASE ENDS.**  
Partial Victory For County In Suit Over Damages.

The action of the Menasha Wood-ware Company against Coos county for \$5,000 damages for right of way for the extension of the elevated plank roadway between Marshfield and North Bend terminated in the circuit court at Coquille yesterday with a verdict for \$400 for the plaintiff. The action was an appeal from the county commissioners who had awarded them only \$250 damages.

This suit held back the awarding of a franchise to L. J. Simpson and Seymour H. Bell for the use of the elevated roadway for an electric line. The commissioners will now grant the franchise, according to the understanding at Coquille providing the holders of the franchise pay the damages awarded.
