DIVIDE FAIR DISTRICT.

In discussing a division of the Southern Oregon Fair district, the Wedderburn Radium says:

"The fourth district comprises Lane, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties, but why such a district was ever formed is more than any one can explain. There is no community of interest between the valley counties and Coos and Curry; there are no transportation facilities adequate for carrying people from the coast to Eugene or Roseburg, or from the interior to the coast when fairs are held and the attendance is in either case, purely local. Only the horsemen make the trip over the mountains and the cities which promote the fairs must depend on the contiguous territory for attendance and not on the country a hundred miles distant and inaccessible in every way for the person of average means. And while these reasons are sufficient to justify two districts, there is another which is even more convincing. The products from the valley cannot exhibit their wares on the coast, neither can the man from the coast travel to the interior and show his products.

"But Coos and Curry counties should not abandon their claim to the state patronage accorded the district fairs. They should go to the legislature, and after explaining the situation, ask for a division of the district as here outlined, or on lines similar. A request for such a division accompanied by a demand for an appropriation as large as that now given the four counties would probably meet with refusal and it would be best to ask for a division of the same. Without information other than that at hand, the Radium does not speak for Curry county, but it believes the citizens would be largely if not unanimously in favor of such an arrangement, particularly so since Marshfield has shown that an annual fair on the coast is in demand and can be made a financial and agreeable success. There is no doubt that a division would meet approval in Lane and Douglas counties, for it would give them more fairs and such a large area as that comprised in those counties should never let a year pass without a fair. They are constantly entertaining home-seekers and no evidence is so convincing to a prospective settler as collective products of the soil. In recommending this the Radium does not wish to be misunderstood. It looks on the matter as a business proposition for both localities and feels certain the interior will see it in the same light."
