HEAVY WIND OFF COAST

Terrific Gale Makes Bar Too Rough For Alliance to Cross Out Today.

A northwest gale blowing fully seventy-five miles per hour at noon today made the Coos Bay bar too rough to have been at this season of the year in a long time. The bar was so rough that Captain Olson of the Alliance, after running down to the lower bay, decided not to attempt to cross out but returned to North Bend where he will remain until 10 o'clock Wednesday morning. The Alliance has a large number of passengers on board bound for Portland but Captain Olson decided it was better to wait a day than to take any chances.

"The bar is the roughest I have seen it in a long time," said Captain Olson after his return. "The wind is blowing at least seventy-five miles per hour and waves are breaking clear across the bar. They pitched me from the life-saving station that it was very rough but I was anxious to get out and ran down but when we saw the condition of affairs, we changed our mind and returned."
