Coquille Repaired.—The old schooner Coquille has recently been repaired and is now being operated in the lumber trade between the Siuslaw and San Francisco.

Raises Big Porker.—A porker weighing 504 pounds, dressed, was brought in from Julius Larson's ranch on Haynes Inlet the other day and attracted much attention.

Erects New Building.—H. C. Noble is moving his Broadway residence back to the rear of the lot and will erect a business building on the site formerly occupied by the house.

New Fog Signal.—Capt. Pond, Inspector of this lighthouse district, is investigating the advisability of placing a fog signal on the Port Orford reef near Cape Blanco. Mariners have often expressed a wish for a fog signal there.

Loses Coal.—While coming down from Catching Inlet, with a scow containing twenty-five tons of coal, John Wall had the misfortune to overturn his load in the Bay, near the cold storage plant. The coal was from the Newcastle mine, and of course was a total loss. The scow was raised.

Walk From Portland.—D. C. Greenwalt and W. Little of Portland, are walking from the Rose City to Coos Bay and are hunting and fishing en route. They are making the long trip by easy stages. They passed through Florence a few days ago and stated there that they were having a delightful trip.

No Council Meeting.—Owing to the inability to secure a quorum, no meeting of the city council was held last evening. Councilmen Lockhart and Nasburg were attending court at Coquille and Mayor Straw did not show up. The other four members of the council were present but were unable to transact any business.

Builds New Dredge.—Herman Larson's new dredge is rapidly nearing completion and he is making arrangements to begin operating it in the Beaver Slough district in about two weeks. The banks of the stream are being cut down so that the shovel will work all right. The dredge will work as far as Coaledo.
