FISHERMEN TO HAVE SIGNS

Game Warden Cal. Wright Tells of Recent Changes in Regulations.

Local professional fishermen must provide themselves with signs showing that they are licensed or they will be arrested and subjected to fines. The Oregon law provides that every licensed fisherman must erect a monument at his landing, the monument to consist of a black letter sign on a white background giving the number of his license. The letters must be at least six inches deep and the number preceded by the letter "O," the same as automobile numbers.

In addition to the monument, the fishermen must have similar signs placed on their seines or nets, the letters on the net signs to be at least one inch deep. Game Warden Cal. Wright is serving notice on the fishermen of these requirements and will insist that they are fulfilled.

Limit Size of Seines.

John Nielson of Prosper, Ore., has just received a letter from Attorney General Crawford of Oregon, stating that a new law which became effective September 10, provides that no seine more than 150 fathoms long or more than 4 1-6 fathoms deep shall be used in the waters of Oregon.

It was reported when this was enacted that it applied only to the Columbia river but Mr. Crawford says the wording of the law makes it apply to all waters over which the state of Oregon has jurisdiction. Some fishermen at Bandon have seines or nets larger than this and they will be compelled to reduce their size.

Fix Price of Fish.

The Coos Bay fishermen at a recent meeting agreed to charge fifty cents apiece for chinook salmon and twenty cents apiece for silversides. This is higher than the cannery at Empire proposed to pay. The fishermen have notified the cannery officials of the price they agreed upon

Episcopal Prelate Will Not Hold Services in Marshfield Friday, as Has Been Announced.

The Rev. Dr. Horsfall, who went to Gardiner today to meet Bishop Scadding of the Oregon Episcopal diocese, telephoned from there that Bishop Scadding would be compelled to cancel his engagement to hold services in Marshfield Friday morning. The trip has been a little more strenuous than Bishop Scadding expected and so he will reduce the number of services he will conduct here. Today, he is conducting services at Gardiner.

Local Episcopallians are planning to entertain Bishop Scadding. During his stay on the Bay, he will probably be the guest of J. W. Bennett, a close personal friend. The revised appointments for his visit here are as follows:
