IN THE GOOD OLD DAYS.

Sometimes we think nowadays that we are too bitter and uncharitable in our politics, but even our best efforts to be intolerant and unkind are decidedly amateurish when they are contrasted with the real vindictiveness of olden times.

For instance, when Andrew Jackson was elected to the presidency a second time in 1832, opposition newspapers openly expressed the hope that he might be removed by death before his inauguration.

In 1836, when Van Buren was a candidate through the dictation and domination of Jackson, and the wretched affair of the deposit of national treasury funds in various banks over the country was a red hot issue, another anti-Jackson and anti-Van Buren newspaper declared viciously: "Are bribery and the spoils of the nation to be held up as the only inducements for American politicians? If so, let the ruffian violators of decency and honor, now rioting over their prey, draw their daggers and immolate the republic at once."

After all, "the good old days" are largely imaginary, and they do not compare favorably with these rare new days of the present. The world has progressed. Men are not yet perfect, but they are at least more charitable in politics.

You also find in them encouragement not to worry about the state of the nation or to take your politics too seriously. Back in 1832, when the press boldly expressed the hope that Andy Jackson, "the Wicked," might die rather than see his administration policies continued, nearly half of the people thought the country was going to the demdition how-ows. But it didn't. It came through that crisis and still other and greater ones. Of course a "don't care" attitude must not be assumed in political matters, but men ought to be optimists rather than pessimists.

USE FOR TEA

Prof. Waynbaum, M. D., of Paris, publishes some queer facts regarding the nature and purposes of tears, coming to the conclusion that tears act upon the human organism "like chloroform, ether or alcohol."

"When a human being gives way to sorrow," says Dr. Waynbaum, "the blood pressure in the brain decreases. The tear helps in this process, which benumbs the brain, for the time being, causing passiveness of the soul almost approaching indifference."

"Tears are blood, changing color by their passage through the lachrymal glands. One can drown his sorrow in tears as one can benumb his senses by the use of alcohol or drugs."

"Children, whose nervous system is particularly tender, derive great benefit from crying occasionally. The same may be said with respect to women."

The professor likewise explains why laughter, sometimes produces tears, but the explanation is too technical for reproduction.
