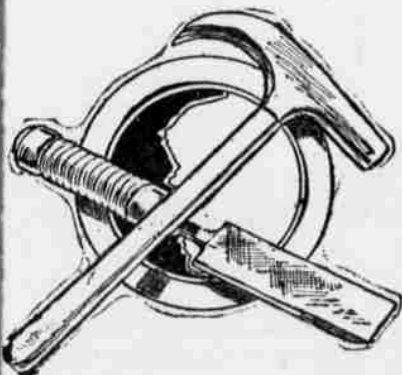

METHODISTS ARE AT WORK

Not Enough Sunday Schools—Exhibit at Seattle Exposition.

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 28.—"Of 160,000 school children between the ages of 4 and 20 years in Oregon, 100,000 do not go to Sunday school," was the statement made by Dr. G. A. Blake, representative of the Sunday school board of the general conference, before the Oregon Methodists in annual conference here. The speaker said further that there were 2,200 school districts in Oregon and in 1300 of them there were no Sunday schools of any denomination.

In his arraignment of conditions in Oregon, Dr. Blake said the Methodists were behind the Presbyterians and the Congregationalists in this work. He said six men were in the field working for the Presbyterian home missions in Oregon, which included Sunday school organization. The Congregationalists also had a large number doing the same work in Washington and Oregon. The Methodists had none.

The Methodists of the northwest will spend \$5,000 to establish and maintain an exhibit at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition to be held at Seattle next summer, showing the growth and work of Methodism. The matter was taken up at the session of the Oregon annual conference this morning and heartily indorsed.

ASK FOR DEEDS.

O. & C. R. R. Land Applicants Petition for Right to Intervene.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 28.—Denying that the United States court has authority to declare a forfeiture of that portion of the unsold lands granted to the Oregon & California railroad, by act of congress, for the purchase of which they have made regular application as provided in said act, 628 residents of the state of Oregon have petitioned the court to allow them to intervene in the case of the United States against that company for the recovery of lands alleged to have a value of \$40,000,000.

The petitioners are standing on the fact that each of them made due application for the acquisition of not more than 160 acres and offered the railroad company \$2.50 an acre in payment. The railroad is alleged to have refused to accept the price, but it is claimed that the persons who made the offers in good faith acquired an estate interest, and now stand ready to settle upon and improve the tracts of land selected. It is alleged that the act of congress intended that the land should become of use to the people who desired to be residents thereon, and that when they made bona fide offers to purchase they fully complied with the requirements of the law in so far as they were able to do so. Attorneys A. C. Woodcock, of Eugene, D. R. Murphy, of Portland, and E. L. C. Farrin of Marshfield, are representing all of the petitioners. They say this action will avoid a multiplicity of suits if the court allows them to submit their case. They ask that the court shall enter an order requiring the company to accept the payment of \$2.50 per acre and issue deeds.

The case involved is that of the United States vs. the Oregon & California Railroad and others, wherein it is alleged that the terms of the grants by congress of certain alternate sections of land have been violated by the action of the company in that it is said the company has sold tracts of more than 160 acres and for larger prices than \$2.50 an acre.
