CEMETERY IS IMPROVED.

Bodies in Coquille Burying Ground Are Moved.

The local Masonic lodge is making many improvements in their cemetery these days. A number of bodies which had been irregularly interred have been taken up and properly buried, and more will be transferred with the advent of cooler weather. John Quick and Charles Myers have been chiefly employed in this work. They report that some of the bodies exhumed were found to be in different stages of preservation, that of Dr. Steele, who died in Bandon January 8th last, being a most notable instance. Though in the ground for a period of eight months, the doctor's remains were just as natural and unblemished as they appeared the day of the funeral. It was only by accident that the features of the body became exposed. The Masons intend spending upwards of \$2000 in making their cemetery one of the
