FOUNDING THE PORT.

Coos Bay and all her projected improvements including the new railway would be better entrenched and better qualified for development in every direction if the legal foundations were laid for her port status. It would give her a leverage, a significance, a base of operation, a right of initiative, she does not yet possess, and contribute abundantly to that prestige she requires in asserting her claims to recognition from abroad.

The suggestion made at a recent meeting of the Chamber of Commerce to inaugurate a movement for compassing this important and worthy project should be acted upon at the earliest possible moment.

The port principle commends itself largely and sensibly to the average citizen, and will constitute a valuable working purchase for many things intimately associated with it as public benefices.

PIONEERING IN OREGON.

As the traveler goes through the more primitive sections of southern Oregon it becomes evident that the pioneering days of the state are by no means over. Scattered through cabins where settlers have taken up these wild tracts are many little cabins where settlers have taken up homesteads or purchased tracts of cheap land and are establishing for themselves permanent residences, clearing the rough land and converting it into tillable farms and good stock ranges.

In the rougher part of Coos county at the foot of the Coast Range, and in the more unsettled parts of Douglas county this is particularly true. Some manage to get little places near settlements and other are a long distance from towns and neighbors.

The opportunities for pioneering in southern Oregon are many. There is room for thousands who want to live in the country, and do not mind a little isolation and who are willing to wait and work.

There are several ways in which this can be done: Homesteads can be taken up—there are hundreds left if one will hunt for them—and tracts in the forest reserve can be filed upon. A settler can also purchase a relinquishment of a homestead. This may cost from \$150 up.

The life might not appeal to a man who is in a hurry to get rich, but if one has a big family to take care of and no money with which to buy a cultivated farm, he will probably do better in such a place than if he worked by the day in any of the cities. Many men are making a good living in this way. They get all the fuel they need, construct their farm buildings from farm timber, clear the land, plant a garden and turn out some livestock. Year by year the settler can make improvements and increase the amount of land under cultivation; in the end he will have a good farm to leave to his children and will have made a considerable living.

Yes, of course, it is hard work; but the pioneer life is independent and the life is not so bad. The climate is excellent, the country attractive, the soil will grow most anything, the streams abound in fish, the woods in game and with all, it is an easy-going comfortable life.

Men from the east, who came to the Pacific coast with but few assets but their willingness to work—and many of the so-called native people have done this very thing—now own highly cultivated farms in the thickly populated districts.—Portland Journal.
