RECALL RUMOR CAUSES STIR

City Officials Hear of Attempt to Oust Them But Can't Verify Report.

Reports that a petition to invoke the recall in Marshfield and oust several members of the council and other city officials from their offices is current on the streets, but these rumors could not be verified today.

The report was circulated among the city officials late yesterday afternoon just prior to the special meeting of the council. The names of several were connected with the organization of a movement to invoke the recall, but all of these who could be seen by a Times' reporter today denied participation in such a movement.

Mayor Straw, Councilman Nasburg and City Attorney Farrin said that they understood meetings were held at the Finnish hall yesterday afternoon and evening concerning the matter. No one could be found who would admit that he attended such a meeting.

The report caused quite a flutter among the members of the council and the other officials and some of the councilmen talked of resigning at once.

Col. Wm. Grimes said that he had heard of such a report but that he would not countenance any such movement.

F. S. Dow said that he heard there was such a thing talked of, but that he personally was opposed to it.

CONTRACTOR STONE IS ANGRY AT COUNCIL

Declares That Marshfield Body is Making Anarchists and is Worse Than Russian Government.

Contractor Stone, one of the members of the firm that recently completed the Laurel street improvement, last evening told Mayor Straw and the city council that the Marshfield body was making anarchists and declared that it was worse than the Russian government.

Yesterday, the council accepted the grading of Sixth street and ordered Bjorquist and Harquist paid \$900 on their contract.

Holm and Haglund were ordered paid \$279 on their contract.

A petition from property-owners on 'C' street, between Fourth and Wilcox streets, objecting to the proposed raise in the grade of the new elevated roadway was laid on the table with the understanding that no heed would be given it.
