WHERE ARE THE HARD TIMES?

Discussing this question the Indianapolis Star presents the situation in this form. It is a good foil to the habit of so many people who, no matter what the prevailing condition of the country may be, are sure to speak of "the hard times." The Star says:

"The Indianapolis citizen going about his business from day to day hears more or less talk about hard times. The man next him on the street car in the morning discourses gloomily of 'prospects' and considers the outlook discouraging, yet the citizen happens to know that the speaker has lately purchased a sixty-horse power, highgrade automobile and, what is more, has paid for it.

The citizen's next door neighbor strolls across the lawn in the evening to remark lugubriously that he sees no likelihood of better times coming soon, and the citizen casually reflects that the neighbor sent his wife and daughter to Europe this summer for the first time and had himself taken an expensive outing. In this connection, too, the citizen recalls the statements made by several persons in a position to know to the effect that more people had taken out-of-town trips this season than ever before. He hears talk about men out of work, but remembers that when he has needed the services of a number of laborers on several occasions this season he has found it as difficult to secure them as in former years. Altogether he is forced to wonder if times really are hard.

"If he considers the situation that presents itself this week he will be more in doubt than ever. Last Monday showed no less than 13,000 paid admissions to the state fair—an increase of over 10,000 above the numbers on the corresponding days in 1906 and 1907. On the same day were two games of baseball, with a total attendance of something near 35,000. Later days of the fair have also shown an increase in paid attendance over former years—Wednesday having 2000 more than 1906 and 2000 more than 1907. On Wednesday, too, nearly 15,000 people witnessed the ballgame between the Indianapolis and Toledo clubs. In addition to the fair and the ball game crowds have thronged to the local amusement parks and the theater and the shows have been filled.

"Now, the presence of the crowds at these places means a great outlay of money. Farmers have had to spend or they would not have come in greater numbers than ever before from all parts of the state, with their families, to attend the fair and do their fall buying. The crowds at the ball games were not men out of work, but men with money in their pockets, who felt that they could afford the recreation. A great amount of money has been spent this week by the visiting crowds in railroad fares, in entrance fees to the fair and to places of amusement and in the purchase of merchandise—more than was spent last year and the year before, because the crowds have been larger. This does not mean hard times; it means prosperity. Then what has become of the hard times? Is it not that too many of us have fallen into the habit of assuming that they are still here, without considering the facts? Or is it that we give too much heed to the talk of political demagogues?"
