COOS BAY TO GROW RAPIDLY

English Consul Laidlaw Is Very Favorably Impressed With Prospects Here.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 5.—The Telegram says: "Coos Bay may be the headquarters for an artillery company. Adjutant-General Finzer, of the Oregon National Guard, is to visit the Coos Bay country to look over the situation, and if he finds conditions as described, he may recommend the establishment of an artillery company at that point."

"When Adjutant-General Finzer, together with other militia officers, was summoned to Washington a few months ago, the coast defense question was taken up and discussed. It was to find what recommendations the officers had to make regarding the coast defenses that the conference was called."

"People of Coos Bay have taken up the matter with the head of the O. N. G. and urged the Adjutant-General to organize one of the artillery companies at that point. Walter Lyon of Coos Bay, recently visited Portland for the purpose of canvassing the situation with the Adjutant-General, and as a result of Lyon's pressure and arguments, Mr. Finzer will personally inspect the ground."

"Coos Bay, although on the coast and easily approached by the fleet of an enemy, has no fortifications or other means of defense. It is urged that an artillery company be organized and instructed, to serve as the nucleus of coast defenders in time of war. If suitable quarters, enough available material for soldiers and a few other essentials are found, as represented by Walter Lyon and others, Adjutant-General Finzer may recommend the creation of an artillery company. Should this recommendation meet with favor, the company, on being organized, will be equipped with guns for practice and a small experiment station for gunners will be equipped."

"For participating in the annual maneuvers of the citizen soldiery, it is argued that an artillery company can be landed at Astoria with as much dispatch as transporting infantry companies in Southern Oregon."

BONDS ARE BEATEN.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 5.—The proposition to bond the city of Eugene for \$500,000 for the construction of a gravity water system was voted down at the special election by a majority of 158 votes. A hard fight was made by those favoring the plan, but so many bond elections have been held that many voters had become lukewarm on the subject of municipal ownership and gravity system, because so many side issues were raised, that the main point was obscured, and the proposition was defeated.

The people have already voted \$300,000 bonds for a water system, but this is deemed insufficient, and it is not known now what will be done. There is some talk of the mayor and the councilmen resigning and turning the city government over to those who represent the majority, it being argued that they can be of no further public service, since their program has been vetoed by the people. Councilman J. N. Harbaugh has already tendered his resignation.

OREGON PENSIONERS.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—According to the annual report of the Commissioner of Pensions, there are now 7862 pensioners in Oregon, receiving \$1,198,004 annually in pensions; 10,761 in Washington, receiving \$1,651,313, and 2223 in Idaho receiving \$345,035.
