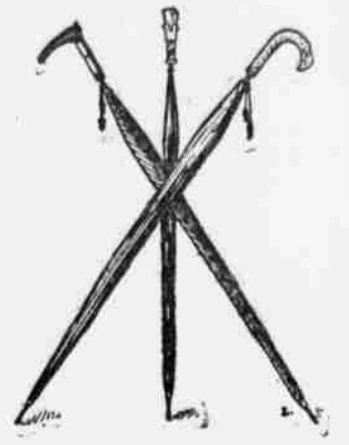

News of Upper Valley As Told By The Enterprise.

Captain and Mrs. C. H. James and children, who have been spending the summer in the Klamath country, returned to Myrtle Point last Saturday and are again at home here.

Burton Deane, the two-year-old son of Mr. Mrs. Bert Doyle of Arago, died on Sunday, the 27th, and burial was in the Mason's cemetery at Coquille, Rev. J. J. McConnell officiating.

Don Green and Chas. Guerin succeeded in getting a fine bull elk on Camas creek last week. The animal had a fine pair of antlers. One side showed seven points and the other six.

Mrs. Hurst, a sister of W. Lee Ray arrived last week from Kansas and is a guest at her brother's home north of town. She came to see her aged father, whose health continues very poorly.

Mr. Everett E. Hatcher of Coquille, and Miss Henrietta M. Nelson of Norway were joined in marriage at Coquille, on Saturday, the 26th, by Rev. B. Jones, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, the ceremony taking place at the parsonage.

Tom Kinnicut was charged with breaking quarantine regulations last Saturday and attending a gathering downtown. His case was brought to the attention of Deputy Prosecutor Liljeqvist, but action on the matter was deferred until the quarantine should be removed from the Kinnicut home.

Louis and Will Ward were taken before Justice of the Peace Dodge, Tuesday by Game Warden Aiken, charged with having run deer with dogs, contrary to the game laws. It was shown that the dog that had been running deer did not belong to either of the boys and the case was dismissed on motion of Deputy Prose-

cuting Attorney Liljeqvist of Marshfield.

Perry Hatcher has been carrying a beautiful black eye for about a week. He says that a sheep attacked him when he was butchering at the slaughter house of the Myrtle Point Meat Market, and gave him the black eye. Some of his friends look at him with interrogative points looking from their eyes when he tells the story. Nevertheless it is true as far as the Enterprise has been able to ascertain.

Rev. C. E. Botts and family left Monday for their new home at Enumclaw, Wash., going to Roseburg by stage and taking the cars from that point. Mr. Botts' new charge has a fine parsonage with all the modern conveniences and pays at the rate of \$1,000 per year. He gave his farewell sermon to a full congregation here Sunday night and made an impressive talk dealing with the beliefs of the Mormons.

Dr. K. A. Leep's home in this city had a narrow escape from destruction by fire one of the cold nights of last week. The doctor and Mr. Dixon who occupies the house with him, had gone to bed when they were awakened by the crackling of flames and found the house full of smoke. The fire was squelched with a few buckets of water, but only after it had burned a large hole in the floor and had started in the wall. The blaze was started from the fireplace.

The Rackleff school house and grounds were sold last Saturday at auction by direction of the school board of that district and there were a number of eager bidders on the ground for the property and it was finally knocked down to Wm. Anderson, whose bid was \$191. There was less than a quarter of an acre in the tract and the price, therefore, was more than \$764 per acre, which is a considerable value even for the fertile river bottom land of the Coquille valley.

**PARIS CARS MACADAM
ROADS, KILLING TREES**

PARIS, Oct. 3.—To lay the dust raised by automobiles, tar has been put down on all the macadamized avenues of Paris with the disastrous result that all vegetation in the neighborhood has been killed.

The latest experiment was in the

Avenue du Bois de Boulogne, leading to the wood from the Arc de Triomphe, which is crowded with autos nearly all year round. The avenue was tarred four months ago and the dust which had been tolerable before was successfully laid, but the fine particles of tar thrown up by passing vehicles have ruined vegetation.

Seven of the finest trees along the famous thoroughfare have been killed and have had to be cut down. The flower beds and lawns suffer even more and to keep them in shape costs the city a fortune every month, more than fifteen times the cost of sprinkling the road, as it was formerly when merely macadamized.

Now the city of Paris has decided to give up tar altogether and the dust problem is, accordingly, no nearer a solution than before.
