Council to Meet—The Marshfield city council will meet this evening to take up several street improvement matters.

Will Speak Sunday—Chas. A. Strickland will deliver an address dealing with socialistic thoughts and actions at the Socialist Hall, Sunday afternoon, at 2 o'clock.

Guests of Mrs. Chandler—The members of the Progress Club, went up Coos River today as the guests of Mrs. W. S. Chandler who will entertain them at the Chandler Bungalow on South Coos River.

Civic League to Meet—The newly formed Marshfield Civic League will meet again Thursday evening at the Knights of Finland hall. C. A. Johnson has been chosen president, F. M. Friedberg secretary, and Jesse Luse sentinel.

Bind Myrtle Point Man Over—Ole Johnson of Myrtle Point, has been bound over to the grand jury on the charge of shooting Ora Masters' dog. Mr. Masters claims the canine was worth \$100 and was wantonly slain. Mr. Johnson waived the preliminary hearing.

Ship Hay Here—The Wilhelmina is to bring over forty tons of hay from the Coquille today, for Henry Holm. A number of other local men are shipping hay here from the Coquille Valley, the North Bend Stables getting thirty tons there. The Wilhelmina will sail from here for Bandon again tomorrow.

Many at School—The new school which was opened recently on Ross Inlet is being more largely attended than was expected when the district, No. 82, was created a few months ago. At first two dozen desks were put in but this was found to be insufficient and another dozen has been added. Hiss Selata Howe is teaching there.

To Open Bowling Alley—C. O. Metcalf, who has been engaged in the contracting business at San Jose, Cal., has leased the Deubner building on Front street, formerly occupied by a moving-picture show, and will open a bowling alley there about October 15. He left on the Alliance today for Portland to secure his paraphernalia.

Remodelled—The building will be remodelled, giving an interior length of 195 feet while only 183 feet is required for the regulation alleys. After he opens, he proposes to organize a Coos county bowling league which will hold regular tournaments in Marshfield, North Bend, Bandon and Coquille.

TWELVE STATES DOUBTFUL.
Represent 128 Electoral Votes—Taft Needs 46 of Them, Bryan 81.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—A comparison of the claims of both parties shows that an even dozen states are included in the doubtful column by the forecasters at the headquarters of one or both parties. These commonwealths are New York, New Jersey, Indiana, Minnesota, Nebraska, West Virginia, Utah, South Dakota and Wisconsin. Some of these states are claimed as certainly Republican by the leaders of that party, while others are just as certainly placed in the Democratic column by the supporters of Bryan. The principal battles of the campaign will be fought in these twelve states, with New York and Indiana the most important scenes of contention.

The twelve states which are placed by one party or the other in the doubtful column have a total electoral vote of 128. In other states which are considered as reasonably certain to give decisive majorities, the Republicans can depend upon 194 electoral votes and the Democrats 161. If the Republicans can gain 46 electoral votes from the doubtful territory, according to this showing, Mr. Taft will be the next president of the United States. On the other hand, if the Democrats carry the doubtful territory to the extent of winning 81 electoral votes, Mr. Bryan will be the next occupant of the White House.

If the Republicans can carry New York and Indiana, Taft and Sherman will almost certainly have a safe margin in the electoral college. Unless the unexpected happens and some of the states normally Republican should go for Bryan. The Democrats will have to secure 27 electoral votes from the other doubtful states. In addition to carrying New York and Indiana, in order to elect Bryan and Kern, California is placed in the doubtful column by the Democrats, while Wisconsin and New Jersey, considered doubtful by Democratic prophets, are listed as certainly Republican by the Taft men. Admission of these claims would change but slightly the results as here given, and the great fight for supremacy will be in the states mentioned.

MEET IN ROSEBURG.
Oregon-Idaho Development Congress October 15.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 5.—At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Roseburg Commercial Club, it was practically decided to hold a meeting of the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress in this city on Thursday, October 15. In connection therewith will also probably be held the Good Roads meeting, which was deferred from last month. In attendance at the Development Congress will be Judge S. A. Lowell of Pendleton; Col. E. Hofer of Salem; Judge John H. Scott, the good roads booster, a delegation of Coos Bay citizens, and other visitors, including perhaps, Tom Richardson, the well-known Oregon booster, from Portland.
