President Roosevelt again hits the nail on the head when he says that "no law defying corporation has anything to fear from you (Bryan) save what it will suffer in the general paralysis of business which any attempt on your part to reduce to practice what you have advocated would bring." True, and it is also true that the one corporation conspicuous for its defiance of law and dealing in an article in common use all over the world seems quite ready to run the risk of Bryanism for the prospect which Bryanism holds out of continuing to defy the law.
