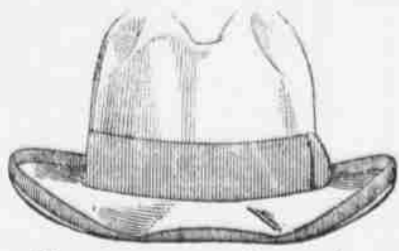

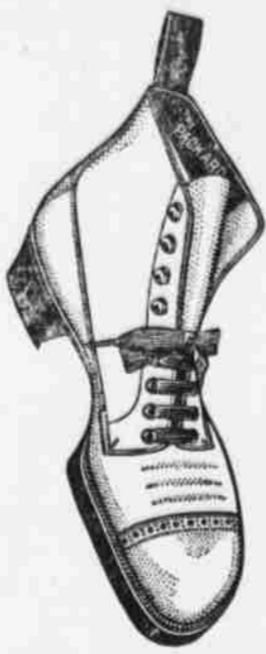

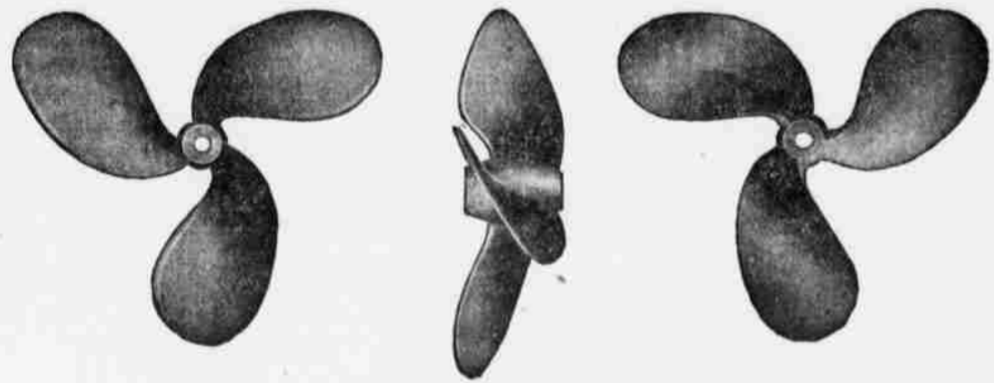

Hall, clerk of school district No. 9, at Marshfield, Coos county, Oregon, until 4 o'clock p. m., Saturday, October 17, 1908, for \$10,000. Coupon School Building bonds in denomination of \$500 each, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, each bond to be dated on date of issue, payable in 20 years optional with district after ten years. All bonds payable at the office of the county treasurer of Coos county, Oregon, or at such bank as may be selected by the purchaser in New York city.
