**OLD \$5 GOLD PIECE IS SOLD FOR \$785**

Rare Coins From James B. Wilson's Collection Bring Remarkable Prices. **NEW YORK, Oct. 15.**—Purchased in 1882 for \$6.25 a \$5 gold piece minted by C. Bechtler, assayer, of Rutherford county, North Carolina, in 1834, was sold to H. O. Granburg, a collector of Oshkosh, Wis., for \$785—a price 124 times as great as Mr. Wilson paid for it. The coin has "C. Bechtler, Assayer," on the obverse with "Rutherford County" in a small circle. On the reverse is "North Carolina Gold," within which is struck in four lines, "5 Dollars, 20 carats, 150 G." Only three other similar specimens are known and two of them are owned by Virgil M. Brand, a Chicago collector, who was an active bidder at the sale for many of the prize coins offered. Mr. Granburg paid \$715 for an 1802 half-dime, establishing a record price for that variety. He also obtained a \$50 octagonal gold slug minted in 1851 by August Humbert, an assayer for which he paid \$260, and a \$50 round gold slug minted in 1855 by Wass, Molliter & Co., of San Francisco, for which he paid \$455. Mr. Brand also set a new high water mark for cents, paying \$100 for a cent of the 1804 variety. He also purchased a rare \$2.50 gold piece, privately minted in 1830 from Georgia gold by Templeton Reid, for which he paid \$335.

**FISH HOOK HOLDS UP THIS TRAIN**

Catches In Gown of Woman As She Steps Off Cars. **NEW YORK, Oct. 16.**—Pretty nearly everything, from rainy days to worn-out equipment, from time to time has held up Brighton Beach trains of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit, but one was stopped at Sands street by a fish hook. On a train were several men who had been fishing. From the basket of one of them as they stood on the car platform there dangled about two feet of line, with a hook attached. As a well-gowned woman tried to get off at the station the hook caught her dress, and she went only as far as the gate. She was the last to pass out, and the guards on the rear cars had signaled to go ahead. She refused to come back upon the platform so that the gate could be closed, and for three minutes the train was kept standing while a dozen "butter fingers" tried to get the hook out without spoiling the dress. Finally one expert worked it loose, and the train started again.

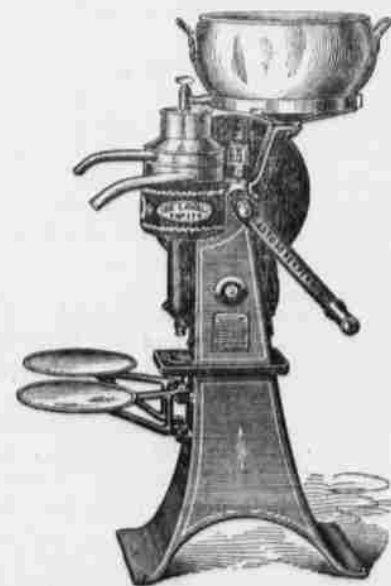
