DORR MAKES REPORT.

Bankrupt Broker Owes \$300,000 More Than Assets. (By Associated Press.) LOS ANGELES, Oct. 20.—A schedule of assets and liabilities of Fred. W. Dorr, the broker who was recently suspended, has been submitted to creditors. It shows assets of \$142,721, liabilities \$489,973.

Emperor William Refers to Balkan Trouble. (By Associated Press.) BERLIN, Oct. 20.—The Prussian parliament opened today and Emperor William in alluding to the Balkans, said that Germany is less interested there than any other power, but that his country would work with the others for a peaceful and satisfactory solution of the present difficulty.
