TEAMSTERS' LICENSE IS POSTPONED AGAIN

City Council Decides Not to Levy Tax on Vehicles For a Time at Least—Many Discuss It.

The ordinance requiring teamsters and owners of all vehicles used on the streets of Marshfield to pay a license was laid on the table last evening with the understanding that no attempt would be made to pass it before the first of the year at least. It may be laid over until next spring. A large number of team and vehicle owners were present and expressed their views on the plan.

John Bear and Mr. Malloy were in favor of imposing a high license, requiring it to be paid for a year in advance. They said that regular team owners in Marshfield should be protected as they pay taxes here. They claimed that during the good months, transient teamsters come in here and cut prices on teaming so that the permanent residents cannot make any money. Chas Doane said that it wasn't right to make teamsters and working men pay a special tax like is proposed by a teamsters' ordinance. He said that if a teamsters' license was imposed, it was only right that every business man be compelled to pay a special license for being permitted to conduct his business here.

Instead of making the license on vehicles, it was proposed to change it to teams but that wasn't satisfactory. Messrs. Bear and Malloy thought the imposing of the license should be delayed for a time at least as during the rainy season which will soon begin, there will be no transient teamsters to be guarded against.

REPUBLICAN RALLY AT NORTH BEND LAST NIGHT

Congressman Ellis Addresses Fair Audience—Reference to Roosevelt Gains Applause.

Congressman W. R. Ellis of Pendleton, addressed a fair sized audience at North Bend last evening in behalf of W. H. Taft and Republicanism. A. H. Derbyshire was chairman of the meeting and introduced the speaker. W. P. Evans was one of the vice-presidents of the meeting.

Judge Ellis' address with the exception of a brief tribute to President Roosevelt was practically the same as delivered in Marshfield. The praise of Mr. Roosevelt and his administration elicited enthusiastic applause from the audience.

This morning Mr. Evans, Mr. Derbyshire and other North Bend citizens entertained Judge Ellis, taking him on a tour of the city. At noon, Judge Ellis left for Myrtle Point where he will speak
