NORTH BEND CORNERSTONE LAYING MONDAY

With the laying of the cornerstone of the new North Bend high school Monday afternoon, in which all North Bend will participate and in which Marshfield and Coos county generally will be represented, North Bend school board, Supt. A. G. Raab and exponents of better educational facilities will realize one of their aims. The new high school, the building of which will cost \$53,000 will be one of the best, most complete and modern in Oregon.

The general plan for the new high school was worked out by Supt. A. G. Raab, and when submitted by him to the school board, it met with their hearty approval as it has from all to whom it has been explained. The plan is complete in every particular, representing the knowledge of the needs of an up to date high

other features of the building's up-to-dateness.

Instead of the old style cloak rooms, individual metallic lockers will be installed, each student having an individual locker.

The arrangement of the various floors of the building is as follows:

Basement will be divided into a recitation room, woodwork and cooking rooms for the manual training and domestic science departments, gymnasium with balcony, salt water swimming pool, lavatories, janitor's room and heating plant room.

First floor will have four recitation rooms, office suite, library rooms and assembly hall.

The second floor will be divided into three recitation rooms, physical, chemical and biological laboratories,

While all North Bend is exulted over the securing of the fine school, it is a source of particular gratification to Supt. A. G. Raab. Having long been engaged in school work, he has long wanted a school building that conformed with his ideas and now he is getting it. Supt. Raab is now serving his third year as head of the North Bend schools and has done some excellent work in that position. Prior to coming to North Bend, he had about fifteen years' experience in schools of the mid-west and is excellently fitted for the work as prior

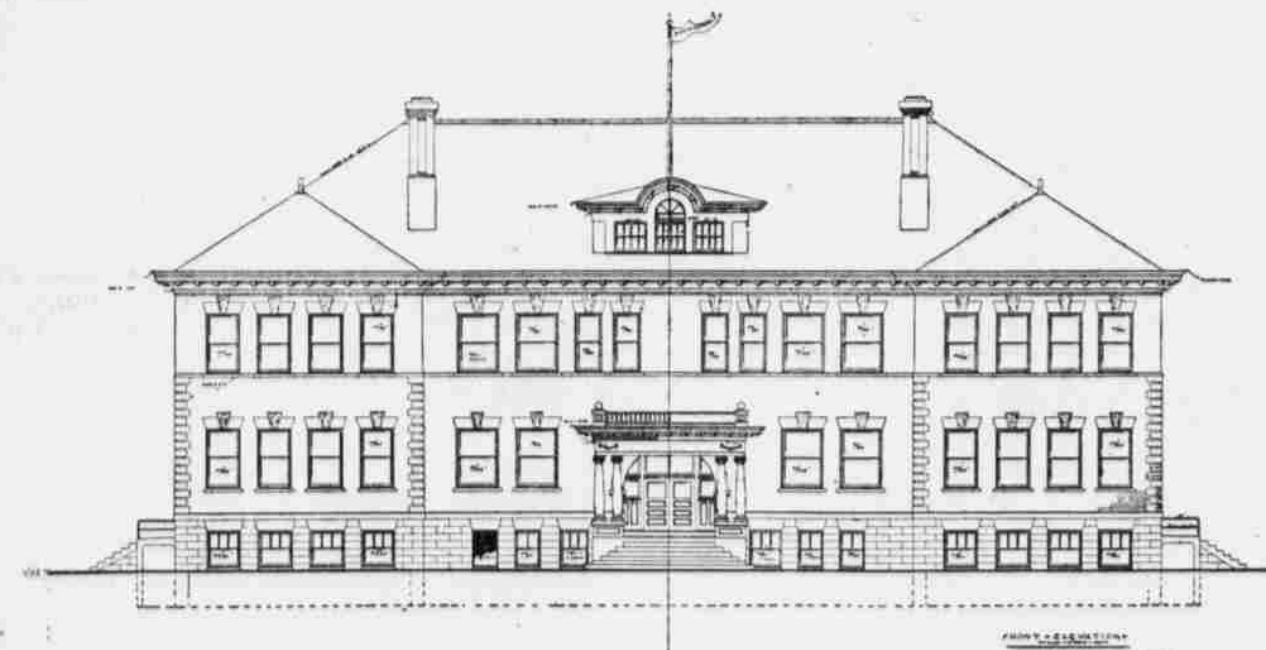

The site for the school comprises four and one-half acres at the head of Pony Inlet and is one of the most slightly locations on the Bay. The site was donated by Major L. D. Kinney. In addition to ample room for the building, there is room for an athletic field, play ground and all the desired surroundings of a modern school.

The building is of brick on a concrete foundation, making it practically fire proof. A complete ventilating system and a hot air heating system, automatically regulated, will be

The laboratories will be completely equipped to perform all the experiments called for by the high school text books in the various branches.

The building will be supplied with gas, water and electricity throughout. Special provision has been made to have all rooms well lighted.

In the cornerstone, which will be laid Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, will be placed numerous documents, including histories of as many North Bend organizations as can be obtained. It is planned to have practically all the North Bend business houses closed Monday afternoon so that everyone can participate in the
