Events of Interest On Lower Coquille Told By Recorder.

C. M. Skells of Coquille, has purchased the Lorenz & Hoyt stock and will conduct the business at the old stand. The store will be in charge of Charlie Lorenz and Paul Skeels.

The two year old child of Mr. and Mrs. H. Nelson, who has recently been very sick with bronchitis pneumonia, is now recovering.
